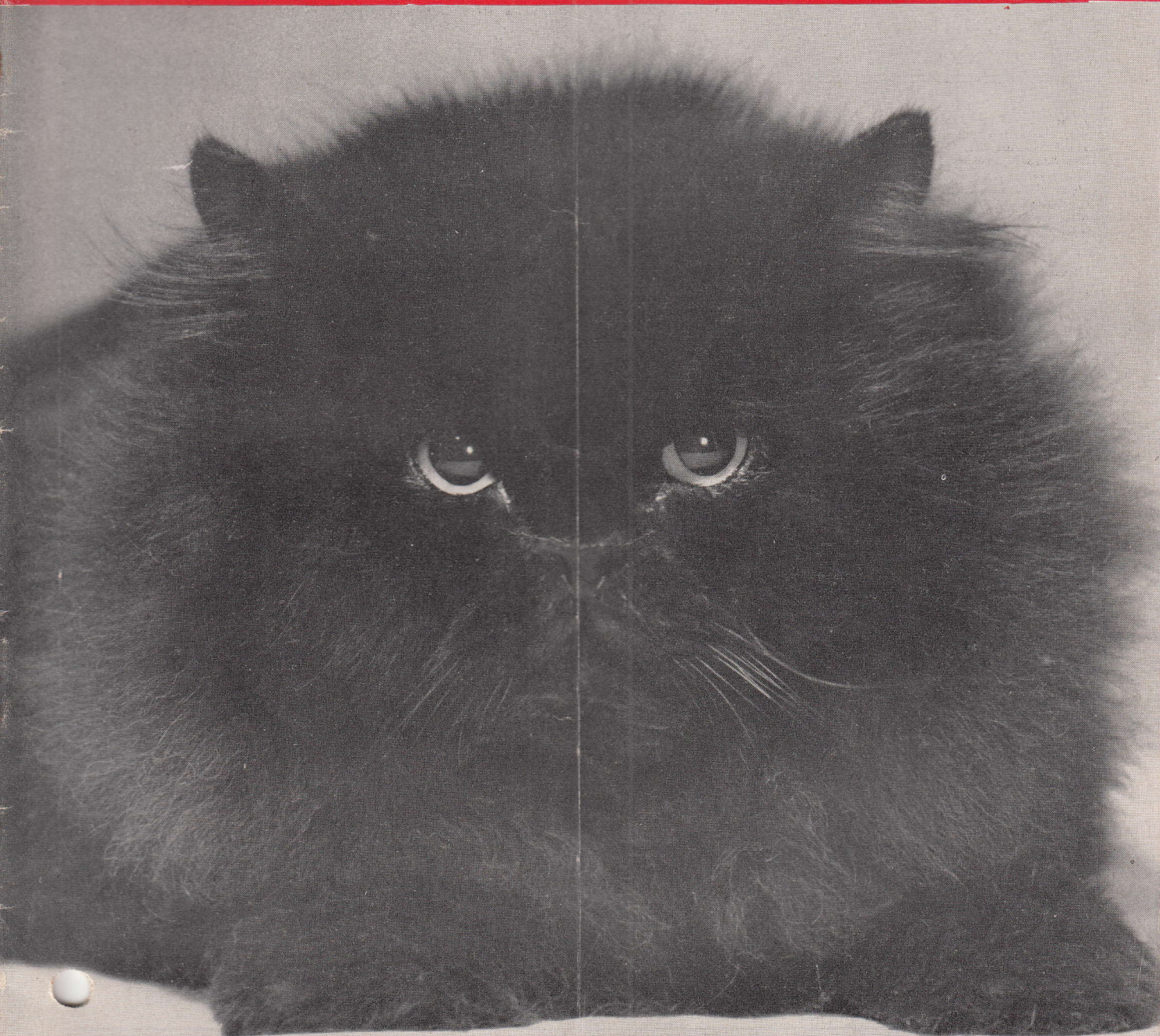

some of our directors can find homes for them!

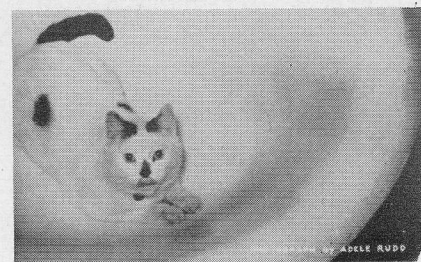
(The program is on every Saturday morning from 11:30 A.M. to 12 noon).

# 1951 All-Americans Announced

## 41 Top Cats Gain Highest National Honor

With this issue of Cats Magazine the 1950-51 Show Season reaches its climax in the naming of the 1951 All-American Cats. For the fifth consecutive year Cats Magazine presents the leading cat in each breed, color, and sex classification based on points scored in competition in all cat shows throughout the United States and Canada.

Complete listings of cats and owners are announced on page thirteen, and on pages fourteen through twenty-one photographs and information about many of the individual All-American cats are shown as presented by their owners in honor of the achievements of their cats.

The 1951 Cat of the Year — the highest scoring cat of all those exhibited — is Grand Champion Pied Piper of Barbe Bleue, Black Male Long Hair owned by Mrs. Frances S. Campbell and Mrs. Bess H. Morse of California. Grand Champion Pied Piper of Barbe Bleue is the first Black to gain this highest of all awards—the Cat of the Year distinction, and he is the first Black to win a Grand Championship, which he completed in his first 1950-51 show.

The 1951 Opposite Sex Cat of the Year is Grand Champion Rosedere DeAnne of Nor-Mont, Blue-Cream owned by Mrs. Merald E. Hoag of Virginia. Rosedere DeAnne also shatters precedent in being the first Blue-Cream to earn this honor, and she is also the first of her color—the world's first Blue-Cream—to gain a Grand Championship.

Sectionally, the winners were very evenly divided this year, with twelve awards going to the West, ten to the East, nine to the South, and ten to the Mid-West. By states, California is well in the lead with eleven (compared to sixteen last year), and Virginia, Florida and Ohio follow with four each. New

York and New Jersey have three; Connecticut and Michigan two; and eight states—Minnesota, Massachusetts, Kentucky, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Missouri, Illinois, and Washington—one each.

Once again the record-breaking all-time winner for repeat All-American honors is Mrs. Frank W. Freudenthal's Domestic Silver Tabby Female, Grand Double Champion Aztec's Belinda. This outstanding cat has been best in her class for each of the five years since the All-American selections were initiated in 1947. Two other exceptional cats share second place honors in this respect—Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Small's Red Long Hair Female Double Champion Smallhurst's Girl of the Sun and Miss Lucile Laird's Quadruple Champion Michael of Beverly-Serrano, Silver Long Hair Male, both having earned All-American designation four years in succession. Double Champion Floridanus Tangerine, Red Manx Female owned by Mrs. Maude R. Barney was A-A in 1948, and after dropping out of the running in both 1949 and 1950, she has once again earned her way into the listing.

Others who have repeated 1950 wins are Double Champion Vee Roi's Ban Shee owned by Dr. and Mrs. J. Sterrett Caldwell, Grand Champion Guthred of

Manx of Glen Orry owned by the Misses Ruth and Ellen Carlson, and Champion Jo-Em-Ette's Valiant Madonna owned by Anthony DeSantis; Mrs. Merald E. Hoag's Grand Champion Nor-Mont's Angelique, Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Miles' Double Champion Briargate Miles Gregory, and Mrs. Blanche Warren's Champion Laos Santee Wat de Casa Gatos.

Mrs. Merald E. Hoag leads in number of winners with her Champion Nor-Mont's Southern Biscuit and Champion Nor-Mont's White Snowman in addition to Grand Champion Rosedere DeAnne of Nor-Mont and Grand Champion Nor-Mont's Angelique. Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Miles would have had three awards in the listings, but before the All-Americans were announced, their Kiva's Kasani, Smoke Female, was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Paul P. Perkins, leaving them with two official winners, Double Champion Kiva's Kachina Doll and Double Champion Briargate Miles Gregory.

Rita and Bob Wilson also gained two

This story was related to me by Mrs. Eva Harris, breeder of many, many Barbe Bleue winners, while I was driving her to a California Cat Club Luncheon recently. As he grew this little fellow fulfilled his breeder's prophecy in all ways, and once when being shown in Southern California was immensely admired by Mrs. Bess H. Morse.

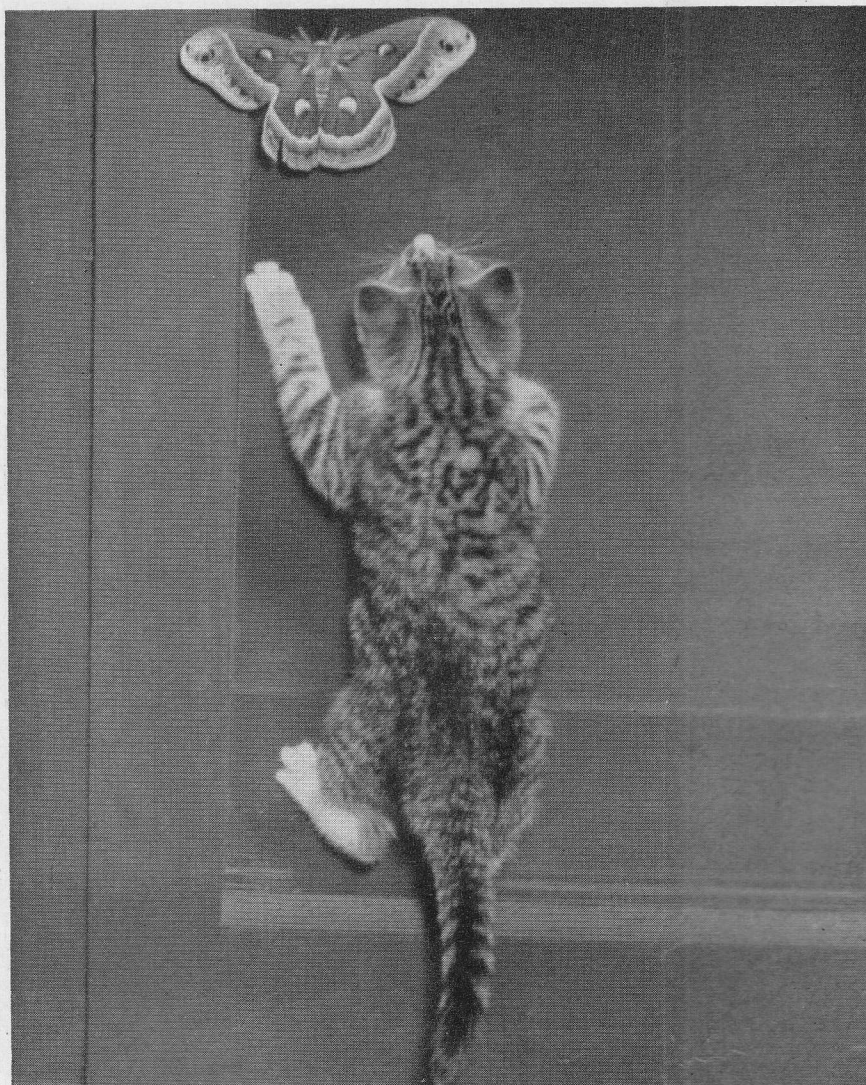

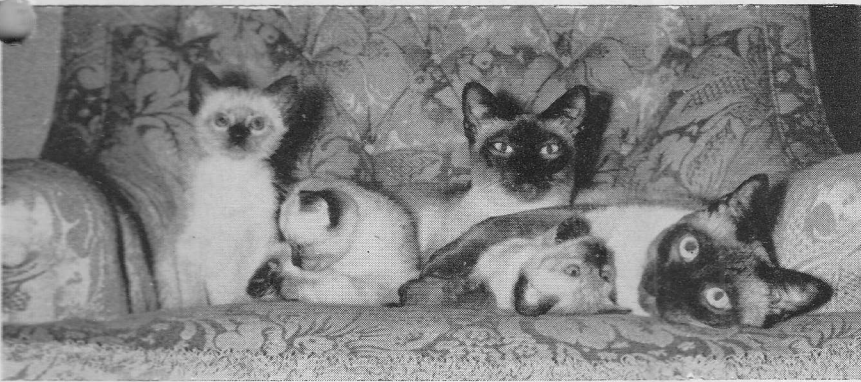

## CAT BOOKS (and a CAT RECORD) IN REVIEW

"Events in the Lives of Tingka and Little Brother", written and published by Ollie Mae Knapper (1.00 prepaid, P. O. Box 4673, Dallas 19, Texas), we found an excellent little diary set down by a lively, talkative Siamese named Little Brother, also known as Singing Sam. Little Brother, or Sam, relates how his names originated, then introduces us to his beautiful, well-behaved, quiet wife Tingka. He describes their life together (oh, these care-free cats!), incidentally making a few philosophical remarks regarding life in general, at the same time revealing a good deal of life as Siamese cats live it, or prefer to live it.

When Sam discovers he is to be a Father, great excitement! And he had been wondering why Tingka had developed such an appetite! He hurriedly got out his photographic equipment and spent much time polishing and perfecting it, judging by the enchanting pictures of the kittens with Mama after their arrival.

If you just like cats, you'll enjoy Sam's comments and have fun peeping at close range into his life and his family's life. If you're addicted to Siamese, you really need this book to prove once more to yourself that they are still the most diverting and lovable of all cats. If there are children around, don't overlook the possibility of putting Tingka and Little Brother in their stockings, either, for although the book was written for adults, we feel any child even remotely interested in animals will find it fascinating.

Whether adult or child, however, we think you'll agree the book is something original in conception and execution, homespun, yet something to which one can return many times to re-examine photographs or browse through one of Sam's monologues. We can't imagine a slim dollar going to bring a more charming private diary to your door.

### THE WALTZING CAT

Something to take the place of "I Saw I Taw A Puddy Cat" is Leroy Anderson's "The Waltzing Cat". (Decca 45 R.P.M., played by Leroy Anderson and his Concert Orchestra). It's a wonderful record for all with three-quarter time in their blood, a lilting thing

which culls up (in our cat-warped mind) the picture of a dancing Siamese capering and cavorting down a moon-lit lane. Suddenly, at the very end of the lane, he stops short in his tracks as he glimpses a white Persian, so beautiful that she makes him gasp, sitting demurely under a feathery willow tree. Off he whisks to examine her at closer range.

Even those who prefer to furnish their own scenario will find, we think, this record refreshing musically; and technically, that is, in the manner in which it is recorded, and in which all registers of all instruments come clearly across, it approaches perfection. Furthermore, cats who yawn at Sinatra or Pinza will be certain to prick up their ears every few bars as the violins imitate rather successfully a "meow". We know, because we've experimented with both Sinatra and Pinza and this new record is the only one that makes a dent.

The reverse side is the "Syncopated Clock", an extremely interesting record rhythmically, though the melodies are pleasant and catchy, too. The combination of both sides offers more in the way of what we in our old-fashioned way call music—enjoyable, original melodies one can hum and danceable rhythms one can beat, than entire albums we've heard of "Pops" concert staff.

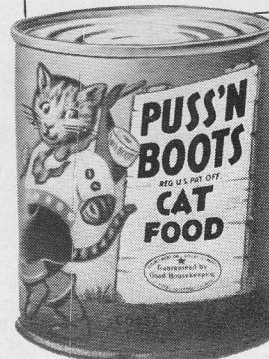

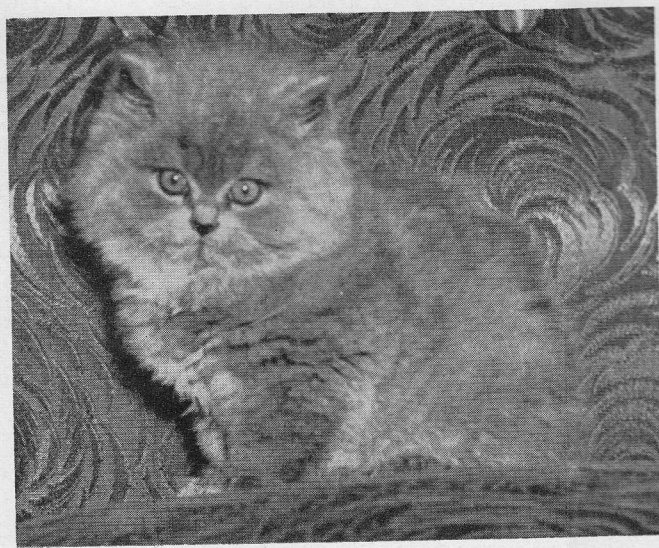

Once again, a cat has been instrumental in saving the lives of human beings, and full credit was given to him in the news story describing the event, published by the Arizona Republic. Michael is the third cat to gain the Cats Magazine Heroic Cat Award this year, and in 1950 a total of nine cats were so honored.

### G. B. CUTLER

Extracts from his talks on the Care and Education of the Young. Delivered at the Thursday Afternoon Parents Club meeting held Tuesday evening, Sept. 7.

As reported by Hettie Gray Baker and Miriam Cutler.

And now let us consider the kitten.

A kitten is an oblong bundle of fur, with a leg at each corner, an animated tail at one end, a round head at the other. The face is usually triangular, with a snub nose designed for sticking itself into everybody's business, long whiskers that are highly ornamental, but whose usefulness is subject to dispute, two ears that can be laid flat back if the kitten is mad enough. It has two eyes, which see nothing the first seven or nine days, but which never miss anything for the rest of its life.

A kitten's mother is a cat. Its father is a cat, too, but so many of them are traveling men that they usually are of no importance in a kitten's upbringing.

This would be a handicap in the less adaptable young of other species, as for instance babies; but a healthy, care-free kitten is the happiest little creature in the world.

First of all, a kitten is charming. Charm has been defined as the thing which if you have it, you don't need anything else.

This charm has, I hope, had its effect on all my listeners. I know it has on me. In my capacity as foster-father to several non-related kittens I have found the enchantment they exert on me ample compensation for the time and effort I devote to them.

They depend on me for cuddling, nose rubbing, for scouring the hard-to-reach-places. In short, for the sense of secure happiness so necessary to their well-being, even their health.

Many of you are more qualified than I to report on other kinds of babies. But contrary to popular prejudice, I assure you that kittens, despite a basic independence, must have love and in abundance. Please remember that.

Sometimes we foster-fathers have the expert assistance of the kitten's mother. But often it depends on us alone to make them feel loved and at home; to teach them to socialize themselves and to be clean in all their habits, how to play and how to guard their homes against predatory animals.

Mrs. John S. Hunter, president of New York's Empire Cat Club went to a meeting of the Mount Vernon Common Council to protest against the local ordinance prohibiting owners of food dispensing stores from having cats on the premises, and came away with a blue-eyed white kitten given her by Council President Otto Schultz. During the course of the hearing the president happened to mention that he was looking for a home for his kitten, and on learning that it was a blue-eyed white Mrs. Hunter gladly offered to take it as she had been looking for such a cat for breeding. Somehow, it had crawled into a spool of scrap metal which was subsequently baled under 2000 pounds per square inch pressure. Nevertheless, after the metal had been pressed and bound workers heard a weak plaintive meow from deep inside and with torches cut it open to free the unharmed youngster.—No wonder they say cats have nine lives, it must be true! Ripley's Believe It or Not, featured recently "Sneaky Pete," pet of Peggy Fay of New York who drinks only Sherry Wine, but another B-I-O-N shows Cary A. Bell's "Boots", of Denver, Colorado, who is twenty-four years old, and who we are assured, "never touched a drop".

Mrs. Mary E. Wooldrige Dear of Belding, Michigan, displayed her red tabby Sylvia's Dream Girl and her five kittens at a booth in the poultry building of the Ionia, Michigan, Fair—It was the first time any cats had ever been exhibited at the fair, and according to a news item in the Ionia County News, Mrs. Dear's booth was the most popular there.

Mrs. C. Edward Voke writes, "One of the Royalist cats, now owned by Mr. C. A. Moorehead, has recently been made Official Mascot of the Republique de France's aircraft carrier, Jeanne d'Arc. It is not one-sided, as the foster-service of the human kitten is. Like you with human babies, I have responsibilities. But my little charges soon take upon themselves a reciprocal care of me which is very pleasant.

I am sure very few of you have foster-children who wash your ears, sing to you and invite you to share the warmest, softest corner with them.

Two close friends of mine, Mr. G. B. S. Kelly and Mr. Mike Baker agree with me that the most difficult part of our self-imposed task is Setting A Good Example. Nor is it always interesting to do this. Mr. Kelly had to ascend a tree several times before his scared-y little sister caught on to the best way to descend. Mr. Baker frankly says that he had to persist very earnestly, and in spite of being bored to death, before his baby tabby sister understood how important it is to scratch on a scratching post.

Neither of these duties seem to fall to the foster-parents of other species.

To sum this subject up in a few brief remarks, and especially having in mind those of my listeners who, although human, are willing to be instructed along kitten lines:—

Remember, kittens love to play with any small moving thing. When it is a mouse, your praise is earned. But when it is a bird, don't raise the roof - the kitten doesn't know the difference.

Remember, also, that there are two basic things a kitten must have to be at its rewarding best. You must give it a sense of security and lots of love.

In my capacity as foster guardian, I am monitor, pector, teacher, nurse, bather and father confessor.

In closing, may I appeal to all of you to take these duties to your hearts, as I have to mine. I promise you you will find it easy to make a kitten happy, so easy that there should be no unhappy ones.

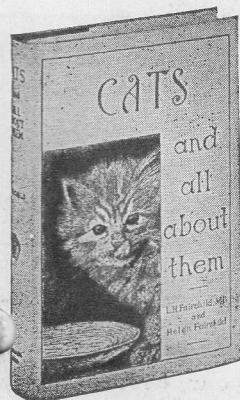

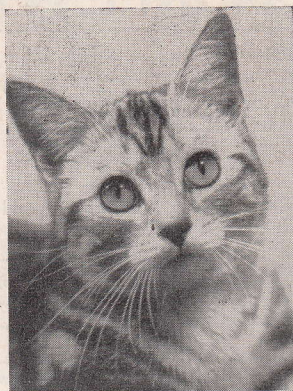
