1953 ALL-AMERICANS ANNOUNCED

The 1953-54 Show Season has already been ushered in with the two successful Canadian shows held in August, and our first 1953-1954 *Show Calendar* appears on Page 22 of this issue of CATS, but there's one important bit of unfinished business from last year—the presenting of the 1953 All-American Awards to the top cats of each breed, color and sex based on their 1952-1953 show records—and that we are proud to do in this the seventh *All-American Issue* of CATS magazine.

Beginning on page 11 is the honor roll of the seventy-nine 1953 All-American cats and their owners and on the next twelve pages are individual advertisements of many of the winners containing photographs and additional information to help you know them better. On our cover we show the Cat of the Year, Opposite Sex Cat of the Year, and the top-scoring Shorthairs of each sex, and have surrounded them with all the other award winners whose photos were on hand at press time.

Cat of the Year and highest scoring of all these elite of catdom, is Mrs. Merald E. Hoag's Gr. Ch. Arlington's Sensation II, Chinchilla Longhair who lived up to her name by compiling the sensational total of twelve Best Cat in Show trophies. She is the first Chinchilla to have earned a C.F.A. Grand Championship. Leading all the male stalwarts is Verner Elizabeth Clum's Blue Longhair, Gr. and Dbl. Ch. Imp. Moonbeam of Gayland's who gained his title by being Best Cat in five shows and Best Opposite Sex Cat in five others.

Captain and Mrs. B. K. Culver's Gr. and Dbl. Ch. Palos Verdes Avatar, Seal Point Siamese male, earned his rating at top of the Shorthairs by sweeping through the huge West Coast Siamese classes to be eleven times Best Seal Point, three times Best Cat in Specialty Shows and twice Best Opposite Cat, plus many other wins.

Best Opposite Sex Shorthair Gr. Ch. Chindwin's Singumin of Newton, also a Seal Point, owned by Mrs. Arthur Cobb, deserves special mention, not only because she was twice Best Cat in All Breed shows—a rare win for a Shorthair—but because all her points were compiled at only four All-Breed Shows, and three Siamese Specialties at all three of which she was Best Cat in Show.

Highest scoring Domestic Shorthair is Mr. Price Cross's Silver Tabby female Mao Texian Tabitha, and top male is Mrs. Hoag's Ch. Nor-Mont's White Snow Man.

Mrs. Maud Barney's Dbl. Ch. Floridanus Tangelo, Red Tabby male, ran up the largest point total for Manx, and leading female Manx is Margaret and Bill Kirsten's Ch. Biddy of MarManx, Particolor, who gained the distinction, of being Best Cat in Show in a Short Hair Specialty seldom done by a Manx.

Just as significant in their own breed color and sex classes are the awards to the other All-Americans on the 1953 Honor Roll. Each has been chosen only after the most careful comparisons of the records of each of the All-Sectional Cats previously announced.

Perhaps as noticeable as any of the winners this year will be the absence of the one name which had been on every All-American listing since the awards started in 1947—the famous and beloved Silver Tabby Shorthair female Gr. and Tpl. Ch. Aztec's Belinda owned by Mrs. F. W. Freudenthal. "Belinda" again had a fine show record, but lost out by the narrowest possible margin to Mr. Cross's Mao Texian Tabitha whose sire, incidentally, was a full brother of Belinda. Long term honors this year go to Double Grand Champion Michael of Beverly-Serrano, Silver Longhair Male owned by Mrs. Helen C. Amos, who now has a record of being All-American for six straight years. Elco's Rudolpho owned by Mr. John Farris and Mr. Neville Fincel, Gr. and Tpl. Ch. Vee Roi's Violet Lady and Mrs. Philip Aaron's Ch. Folly Sabu all were 1951 and 1952 All-Americans. Cats making their second successive wins are Dbl. Ch. Victorian White Shoulders, Gr. and Dbl. Ch. Kiva's Kri Kri of Concordia, Gr. and Tpl. Ch. Lee's Hi-Hat Champaign, Gr. Ch. Nor-Mont's Charm, Gr. and Dbl. Ch. Kewalo Lei Krampert, Gr. Ch. Ambigi, Ch. Lamar's Karen, Tpl. Ch. Senza Coda's Storm Cloud of Ontario, Dbl. Ch. Floridanus Tangelo, Dbl. Ch. Kiddlee, Ch. Miss Hogan, Tpl. Ch. Billig's Patina and Vee Roi's Red Prince; and returning after a one year absence are Ch. Flagstone's Garvinia Schatze, Dbl. Ch. Siesta Barney Google, and Ch. Nor-Mont's White Snow Man.

Honors for individual breeders go to Mrs. Hoag who has four All-Americans. Mrs. Richard O'Donovan and Mr. Harold Tannenbaum have three each, and two go to Mrs. Nikki Horner, Mrs. Howell J. Mueller, Mrs. Maurice J. Shaw, Miss Klara Schick Mrs. Maud Barney, Lt. Comdr. and Mrs. Charles L. Jones, Mrs. Philip Aaron and Mrs. Alice M. Clark.

Geographically, the South took over this year, claiming, besides the two top scoring cats, 31 other All-Americans. Florida has eight; Texas, seven; Maryland, six; Kentucky and Louisiana, four each; and one a piece go to the District of Columbia, Virginia, Tennessee, and Alabama. The West captured 25—20 going to California, three to Washington, and one each to Arizona and Wyoming. and Kansas, one. With four shows less than usual this past season, the East was hard-pressed to make a showing, but did come through with six A-A's, two in New York, two in New Jersey, and one each for Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

Last year was a most successful one for the Cat Fancy with more shows and more entries than ever before. A marked trend was the increasing frequency of three or even four specialty shows along with the All Breed instead of the one or two which had previously been most popular, and on the Coast, the California Cat Club and West Shore Cat Club joined hands to give a combined show which was perhaps the largest ever held in America.

For the first time the method of scoring All-Sectional and All-American cats was made public, and we should like to thank all the club officials, breeders, exhibitors, and others who cooperated in furnishing us marked catalogs and other information without which the selections could not be made.

Now for another season of thrills and achievements by cats and by the Fancy which promises to surpass even the one just closed. Our congratulations go to every winner and to every exhibitor who helped make the 1952-53 show-period so successful, and to every exhibitor and every cat go our best wishes for another great season in 1953-54.

ENTER THE CAT

By Robert Downing

Lillian Moore has written most engagingly for CATS Magazine of dancers who have impersonated cats in ballet.

The spoken drama has also had its share of players interpreting Puss. The American Dean of Feline Thespians is Cecil Yapp, long retired from the stage, who lives in St. Paul, Minn.

When Winthrop Ames produced Maurice Maeterlinck's fantasy, *The Blue Bird* in New York in 1910, Mr. Yapp created the role of Tylette, The Cat.

Recently, gathering material for my book, *Cats and Theatre*, I corresponded with Mr. Yapp. Recalling his experiences, Mr. Yapp writes:

"When I asked Winthrop Ames how he happened to cast me for *The Cat*, he said he was watching me in a game of ten-cent poker while we were on tour during the Spring; and *that* convinced him I'd have to play the part!

"I had a room on the top floor of an old brownstone house. As you know, first nights after the play are anxious moments, waiting for the verdicts of the critics in the early editions of the morning papers.

"When I awoke, I was thrilled to find a cute little coon kitten curled up under my chin, with a collar round its neck on which was engraved 'Van Dyke Studios.' It had come over the roofs and crept along the narrow coping to my window.

"I hoped it was a good omen, and I returned the cute little thing to the studio. Then I picked up the morning papers to find we stood a good chance of being a big success!"

This passage of Mr. Yapp's letter lends further validity to the time-honored theatrical superstition that cats bring good luck to people of the stage.

Cecil Yapp continues: "At a company Christmas party I received a bunch of grotesque china cats and a big package of catnip, which I put behind my dressing-room mirror. The next day I opened the door to find the china cats smashed to bits on the floor, and all the grease paints in a mucky mess of catnip on the table. During the night a cat had come up the fire escape, attracted by the catnip. He crept through the open window, fished the catnip from behind the mirror, and had a grand old drunken party among the grease paints! He probably didn't like my interpretation of the part!

"When I asked Mr. Ames to tell me how he wanted *The Cat* played, he said he would leave it to me to dig out of my imagination—but not to make it too 'catty,' and to remember it was the *soul* of a tom cat I was to play!

"I used cat notes on certain words in the part, always moved at an angle and took an animal pose when possible. In the palace scene I was asleep on a bench as the lights developed. When I awoke, I yawned, sneezed, cleaned my face, purred, and played with my tail. It all went well with the children in the audience.

"The Cat's whiskers made a hit on their own. My dear friend, Jack Wendell, who played *The Dog*, suggested I take

an old feather duster — cut off the feathers, leaving the bare quills which could be sewed on to small pieces of gauze and stuck under my nose with spirit gum. They tapered to sharp points, and were very flexible, responding to all movements of the face."

Maeterlinck called for Tylette to appear in court costume, much like Puss in Boots. So Mr. Yapp donned white knee-breeches and a coat of violet hue. He strapped a dress sword at his waist, wore a powdered wig and a tricorne hat in addition to the facial make-up he has described. And, of course, there was that handsome stuffed tail bringing up the rear!

Eva Le Gallienne and Florida Friebus dramatized Lewis Carroll's *Alice in Wonderland* for the New York Civic Repertory Theater in 1932. In this production, Miss Friebus was heard as the Cheshire Cat.

Heard but not seen! The Cat's face was painted on a canvas panorama, his famous grin attached to a transparency behind which lights faded on and off. Sometimes the Cat's entire face was visible, sometimes only his maddening grin.

To project the Cheshire Cat's speeches, Florida Friebus mounted a stepladder behind the panorama, then meowed and purred her role from this perilous perch. Miss Friebus recalls that she employed a guttural, cat-like voice to deliver her lines.

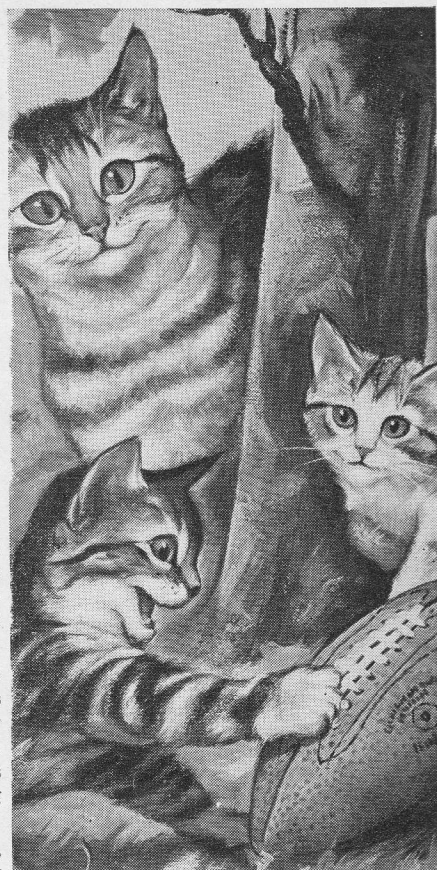
A dear friend of mine, the late Ray Holgate, a Lilliputian actor with whom I appeared in the Lunts' *Taming of the Shrew*, was one of many midget performers to portray cat characters in British pantomimes. In stage work, on radio and television, Donald Bain has made a unique career imitating animal sounds. He did the offstage cat-cries for the feline Uncle Elizabeth in John van Druten's *I Remember Mama*.

In Tennessee Williams' *A Streetcar Named Desire*, which I stage-managed on Broadway, the cat voices of New Orleans' Vieux Carre were created by two clever actresses, Edna Thomas and Gertrude Flynn. Both were carefully auditioned and rehearsed by Elia Kazan.

During the 19th Century, several variety artists appeared in renditions of the famous *Cat Duet*, a musical burlesque in which two singers, a man and a woman, parodied in "catcophony" the vocal mannerisms of grand opera. Latter-day versions of this routine have been used in animated cartoons for the screen.

In 1850, when Douglas Jerrold's successful comedy, *The Catspaw*, was brought to America, the celebrated comedian William Burton played the cat, Snowball.

Many human efforts to interpret the cat theatrically have met with critical acclaim. There have been noteworthy failures, too. In the capricious business of impersonating cats on the stage only one thing is certain—no one knows what Puss herself thinks of all this mummery!

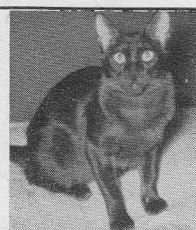

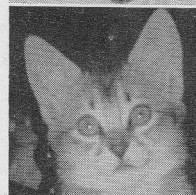

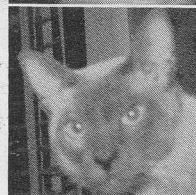

We shall try to discuss shows from the viewpoint of the optimistic, but totally inexperienced novice owner of a cat, to the perhaps disillusioned veteran breeder of many years of showing. What we have to say is the sum total of our own observation and experience, as well as the praise and complaints relayed to us from exhibitor, breeder, spectator, judge and management.

Who gives a show, why and when?

There are four associations sponsoring shows: Cat Fanciers' Association consisting of 82 clubs all over the United States; the Cat Fanciers' Federation (24 clubs); American Cat Association (26 clubs); and the United Cat Federation. These clubs have branches in Canada and Hawaii, also.

The fundamental laws of these organizations state their object to be, among other things, to support an annual cat show.

The show season generally extends from October through February, with two Canadian shows being held in August, and one or two Northern and Western shows usually coming in September. Cats' coats are in the best condition in these months. Springtime is usually taken over for mating and breeding, with the subsequent care of kittens requiring the attention of the owner. Occasionally, kitten matches are held in the summer, a non-championship type of show.

This year, 1952-53, fifty-two shows were given. The monthly totals break down as follows: August, 3; September 2 (shorthair shows); October, 9; November, 13; December, 5; January, 15; February, 4; March, 1.

How the machinery operates

A club, believing it has enough funds in the treasury and sufficient members willing to help, votes to give a show. A show committee, manager, and a secretary are appointed; judges are invited; people placed in charge of publicity. Right here the "gripes" begin. Sometimes a few people assume all the authority, instead of delegating it, and end by complaining that they had to stay up all the night before the show, and therefore should be excused if they are irritable and insulting. Graciousness, good manners, and commonsense are just as welcome at a cat show as anywhere else. Once a person is given a job, let him handle it without interference. The floor manager should not be concerned about clerks, for that is the work of the chairman of judge's clerks. If an appeal is made to the show committee concerning a problem, let them attend to it then and there, and not "pass the buck" to someone else. Delegate your authority and then stick to it. A large show may have need of people in charge of the gate, ring stewards, feeding, aisle stewards, catalog, advertising, announcers, premium lists, and reception. In all this it is well to remember that the human angle is most important, and to alienate willing members is not the sign of a good executive.

Timing

A show which advertizes that judging will begin promptly at 10:00 A.M. should see that it does, for it is unfair to people who went to extra expense, arriving at their hotels the night before, in order to be on time, to meet delay of three and four hours caused by late comers; or worse still to have the winner's ribbons in one's cat's cage, when an influential show committee member advises you, "that as Miss So-and-So just arrived, and as the judge's slip has not been posted, it isn't final, so of course you are willing to have it reopened".

A competent and popular judge has made this complaint, "It takes too long to get the cats up to the judging cages." This is another unnecessary brake on the progress of the show—the extreme reticence on the part of some exhibitors to bring their cats up. As many experienced fanciers are talking about one day shows in reaction to their displeasure at the time wasted in just waiting around, we had better get to the bottom of this matter. Is it that they want to identify the selves with the cat?

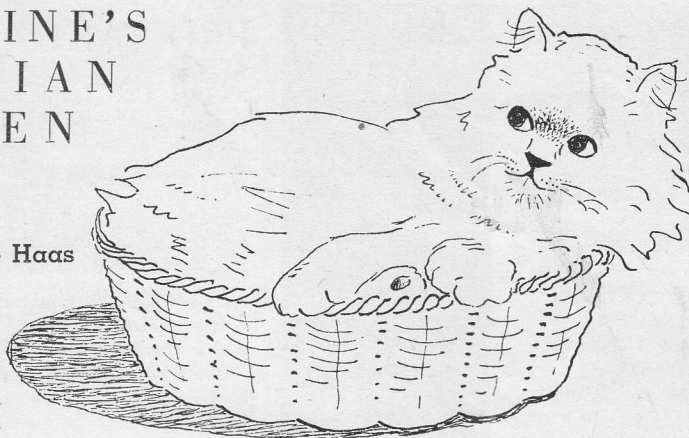
Remedies suggested are to call out the cage number three times, then have a steward bring up the cat. Lack of consecutive numbering will interfere with

Mrs. Mercer's husband, their club's 1952 Show Chairman, is in Alaska, so Pat Casey states the men and Katherine Carroll (one of those gals who can show some men pointers on "nail bending") built the separate little houses and wired in the big pen, while

the rest of the girls sat around talking "four-legged" cat talk. Each member brought a covered dish, so after a nice supper, the men returned to work and finished up about 11 P.M. Various working parties like this in Houston have helped their members fix up their cat quarters. What a wonderful suggestion for other cat clubs.

Unacquainted Siamese and Persian kittens do get along. Recently Mr. and Mrs. Philip Norman (Chung Mung cattery) dropped by for a visit with their Chocolate point, Chung Mung Coq d' Or. We allowed Coq d' Or and a shaded silver kitten to romp on the lawn. Arched backs lasted only about two minutes, after which they decided to take advantage of this rare opportunity and have a playful time. We were all amazed, but it proved kittens raised in "family" style are naturally friendly to folks and other cats. Chung Mung Kits this season (1 S. P. boy, two S. P. girls and 1 B. P. gal) sired by Hollywood's Tondyson of Agincor (S. P. male owned by Ed McCormick and Don Steelman) x Chung Mung Padi-Gris (B. P.) give much promise of future wins for the Normans in the fall shows.

I was sorry to hear that the weather had been so hot for the Marin County Cat Club kitten show. It was held in the amphitheatre at the same time as the Art and Garden Fair, and was so warm that many breeders did not show. A two day kitten show is so hard on the kittens, and sometimes I wonder if it is worth it, especially in the extreme heat. While we may not realize it, kittens, like babies, need extra attention, regular feeding schedules, DAILY. Much, much thought must be used in putting on a kitten show, and expert vetting is necessary. However, the club did net a very nice amount from selling fruit juice at 15c a glass, even after giving the fair 20% of their take—so you can see how hot it was.

I recently learned of an excellent product should your kit develop a bowel disturbance — streptomagma. It works wonders and it may be necessary to get this through your vet, by prescription. A three ounce bottle costs \$3.75, but the results obtained from its use are worth it. It is put out by WYETH, Incorporated, Philadelphia, Pa.

I KNOW all cats are super-intelligent, and have heard and read many tales about their feats—but this true story I would like to pass on to the readers. Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Henderson of Sun Valley, California have a trucking service, and because they wanted company on their deliveries they bought a three months old Siamese kitten—Jeri-Jen. It is necessary many times for them to stop at motels on their long hauls. Jeri-Jen accompanies them at all times, rides peacefully in the cab of the truck, no leash. He has, during his travels, learned a very annoying habit, how to turn on the electric light switch—so during the night the Hendersons never know when they will

steward's efficiency. Officials excuse the jumbled arrangement as being necessary to the big breeder, who pleads that he can't oversee his cats when they are scattered. He should hire an assistant or submit to the steward. Failure to get a cat up on time should be reason for the judge to disqualify it and proceed with judging the class without it. We have had the experience of finding our numbered cage early in the morning, cleaning it and decorating it, then leaving the hall for breakfast, only to discover on our return that the big breeder had appropriated not only our cage, but the whole row. Appeal to the manager gets only the response, "Take any empty cage. Don't make a fuss."

..Last minute grooming of cats is another reason for retarding the show. If a cat is in good condition and received regular attention at home, it won't need a grooming job. Persian's coats do not become tangled and knotted overnight. It is the result of weeks of neglect. All Siamese need is the stroking of the coat merely by the owner's hand. Complicated grooming processes smack of deceit.

Why do shows invariably start late the second day?

Why don't they close promptly, even before ten the last evening? An earlier closing hour of nine o'clock is favored by breeders who have had unhappy experiences, missing the last train or bus, forced to go to the extra expense of staying another night at the hotel, or arriving home at four A.M. in a taxi, which a lone woman fancier, often as not, must share with a total stranger.

That busy club, the Marin County Cat Club is having a unique Judging Contest. To be judged will be 1 S. P., 1 B. P., 1 C. P. Siamese, 1 American Short Hair and 2 Long Hairs. The contestants must be adults and may compete in classes as follows: 1. Novices—open to individuals who have been breeders or exhibitors for a period not exceeding three years. 2. Open—this is open to individuals who have been breeders or exhibitors for not more than five years (also open to Novices). 3. Champions—open to judges recognized by any association officials, and to breeders of more than 5 years. It costs the contestants \$1.00 to enter and \$1.00 for the class entered into. There are six judging stations and the contestants are allowed only 1 minute to handle the cat, which with thirty contestants makes only 30 minutes of handling for the cat. I like THAT! After all contestants have handled the cat it is returned to its cage and may be viewed by the contestants until three o'clock, but under no circumstances will the cat be removed from its cage for the purpose of further handling.

Here is resume of their program:

11:00 Three Judges score cats and turn score cards over to referees.

11:45 Referees average judges scores.

12:00 Lunch.

1:00 Start of contest. Approximately 1 hour to handle and 1 hour to examine in cages.

3:00 End of contest—Referees collect cards and compare scores.

3:45 Winners announced and award.

4:00 Judges explain their scores.

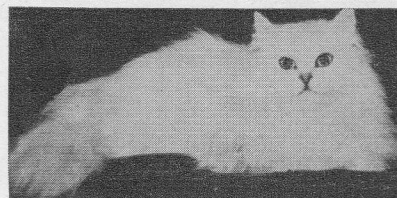

What's a Blue Smoke

By Katherine Beswick

Since the report of the ACA Annual Meeting told of the rejection of a proposal to recognize and classify Blue Smokes in that organization, many people are asking, "What is a Blue Smoke?" Even a number of breeders seem to be confused—because, of course, Blue Smokes are still rare.

A Blue Smoke is not a black with a grayish-blue undercoat. That is still a "spoiled black". A Blue Smoke is not the standard Smoke with the slightly bluish tinge and muddy undercoat which is so often produced when breeding in Blue for type; that is still, unhappily, just an off-color Smoke.

A Blue Smoke is blue. Read "blue" for "black" in the Smoke Standard, and you'll come very close to it. The distinguished and distinguishing characteristic of both Blue Smoke and Standard Smoke is the sparkling white undercoat. Where the Standard Smoke wears a light silver frill, the Blue Smoke carries a ruff of palest blue—just off-white.

Several members of the California Persian Society are working on color-breeding of these spectacular "new-comers", and are much interested in knowing what the Blue Smoke population of the country is, and where it is located. If you have a Blue Smoke—and particularly if you have a second or third generation Blue Smoke—will you write Katherine Beswick, Secretary, California Persian Society, 730 Hillcrest Drive, Redwood City, California. If you care to give any data as to the breedings which produced your specimens, we should be most interested. If you will inform us—and send along follow-up information on kitten production—the secretary will attempt to establish a Blue Smoke "roster", so that we may have something compelling to present to the several Associations of the Cat Fancy before next year's Annual Meetings.

But please read your Smoke standard carefully, translating "black" into "blue." Many alleged Blue Smokes have been reported, and have turned out to be unsound blacks or blues, or unacceptably-colored standard Smokes.

And good luck to every one of you who may be trying Blue Smoke color breeding.

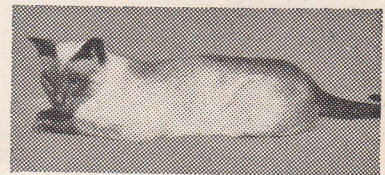
