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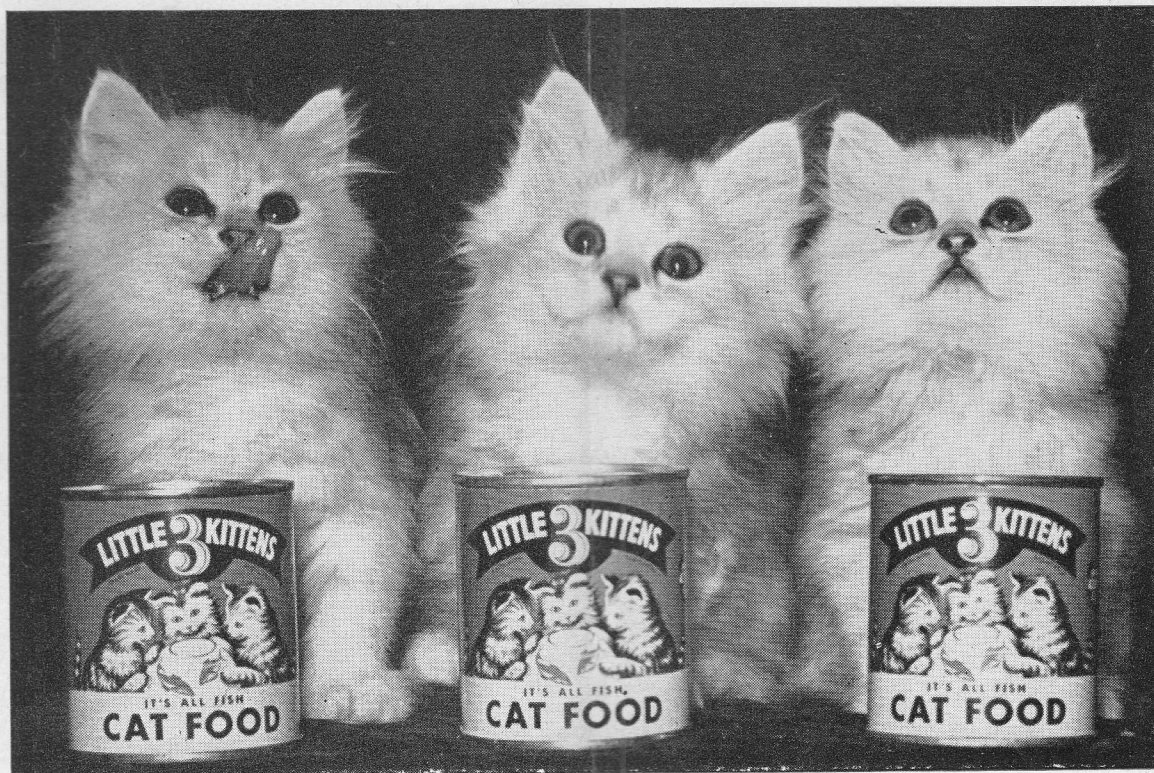
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## The Readers Always Write

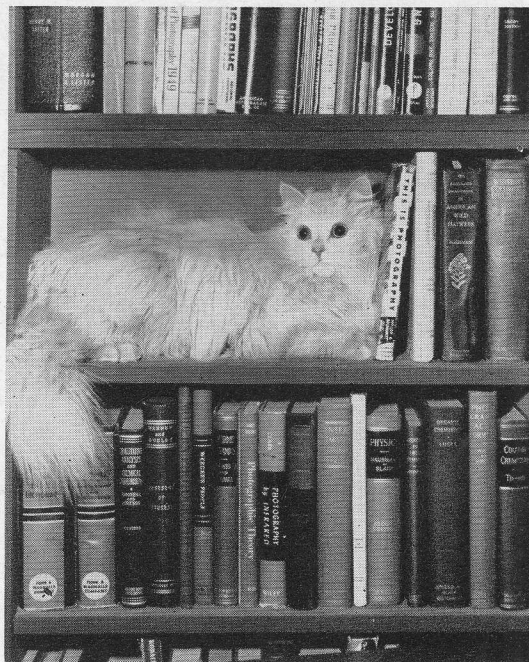

# NATIONAL CAT WEEK -- NOVEMBER 1-7

## A Message from National President Guy Bogart

Original National Cat Week, Inc., the first seven days of each November, has become an established institution in the U. S. A. and has its counterpart in England. It is for ALL CATS, and on its board of directors are both ordinary every-day cat lovers and owners of All-American ribbon winners who realize that the future of their lovely and honored prize-winners is bound up with the welfare of every ordinary or stray cat in the world. I would rather write of the stories of my cats and yours but circumstances have made it necessary to hold up the needs of all cats--and of course that includes all the Fancy, yet with their humbler but by no means lesser cats. On N. C. W. board of advisors are such leaders in the Fancy as Alice M. Clark, Blanche W. Warren, Billy Bancroft, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Marshall.

E. E. Whiting in his BOSTON HERALD column has called me "the Cats' Attorney," and Hettie Gray Baker in her 195 CAT TALES, "public relations officer on behalf of cats." I accept the crusading call--as long as there is injustice in the world to the injury of any cat.

National Cat Week is off to a good start this year--we shall give a more definite report later. We mourn the death of Miss Lydia O. Cypher, long secretary-treasurer, who gave so freely of her time and efforts. We hail, however, a prominent member of the Pittsburgh Fancy--also a successful business man--Rollin A. Cable, 1072 North Avenue, Pittsburgh 38. He has approached the job-- free of course, furnishing headquarters and equipment in addition--at a real sacrifice. The least we can all do is get behind him. Our only source of income is the sale of the N. C. W. Seals at \$1 per hundred, which makes you a member for the year. All printing and postage bills and all educational literature must be sent from this amount.

Contribute liberally, therefore, instead of merely buying a dollar's worth of seals! And you can order your seals now--and a large number of us use them the year round. They'll be lovely this year--Walter Chandoa the nation's greatest cat photographer is selecting one of his photos and expert professional supervision is being given the design and printing to make this a noteworthy seal.

We do not ask or think it best to tie up efforts of cat lovers in clubs or groups for National Cat Week--just that all who will do their bit Nov. 1-7 each year in securing publicity in newspapers and other ways for all cats--and buy all the seals they can using them throughout the year. Our slogan embodies our entire aim--to bring to all

cats "Appreciation, Understanding and Better Care."

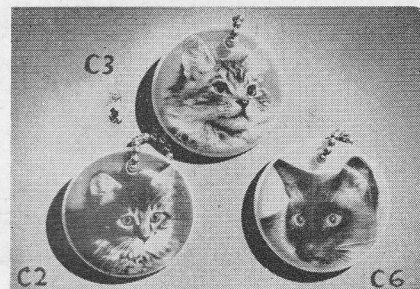
That slogan has been adopted by one of the most successful and helpfully original organizations of many years, The Central Maine Cat Club, of Skowhegan, Maine. It was formed as an unpaid, part time hobby--with nominal dues to pay for reports. Owners from the Fancy and the owners of ordinary cats are united and for the past two years have united in holding shows, photo exhibits and general exchange of information and encouragement. Members are beginning to join from coast to coast and I value my own membership. Miss Ruby Dyer of Skowhegan, the energetic secretary-treasurer is on the N. C. W. National Council.

Animal Birth Control can well be one of the educational aims of N. C. W.--for this is the most important campaign now before the cat world. It is not new in idea or practice, to be sure, but only recently has it taken on the practical application as a definite program. Enabling the folks who otherwise could not afford neutering of cats and dogs, and educating those who can afford it to do so was started a few years ago by the Humanitarian League of Long Island. It is being worked as a part of the program of centers like the Good Shepherd Foundation of Los Angeles and Mrs. Constance M. Barton of Everett, Wash., in The Animals' Crusaders. All other methods are surface palliatives which *solve* nothing; A. B. C. will eliminate the problem.

National Cat Week is the target annually for a nation-wide barrage on the part of Miss Gertrude Charny against all cats, both in general newspapers and magazines and the agricultural journals. To help you on this and also in preparation for her 1955 onslaught on state legislatures for anti-cat legislation--we anticipate bill introduced in California, Illinois and Indiana--I shall later brief you to date on this subject. Incidentally, in many states in the fall you will vote on state and local candidates. It is a wise cat lover who knows the candidates and how they stand as to humanitarian problems before voting.

In closing--we need your orders for seals NOW. Our past campaigns of \$1 for 100 seals has perhaps been misleading. We appreciate every dollar order--but we *Need* more. Be as generous as you can--National Cat Week is to foster Appreciation, Understanding and Better Care for ALL CATS--and that's worth several dollars from each of you.

The Cats' Attorney rests the case before you the jury. But the case can be appealed if the jury is not sufficiently interested in rendering a verdict of a liberal contribution by every cat lover for ALL CATS.



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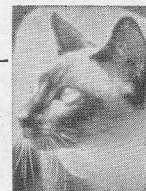
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## TIPS TO THE NOVICE FROM A NOVICE

Should I Go to a Cat Show? — by Blanche Wolfram

By all means go to a show. See the glamorous Whites, the mysterious Blacks, and the sedate Blues. See the lovely Silvers, Creams, and Reds. Look at the beautiful colors of the Tabbies and Torties. Then, too, the exotic, oriental look of the Siamese, Burmese, and Abyssinians. The Manx, Russian Blues, and many Domestic Cats will also catch your eye; all groomed to perfection, beautiful beyond words. Meet and talk to the many fine folks who are there. They welcome your questions and all are ready to help you.

Even better than just going to a show, why not enter a cat in a show? You will find it a most thrilling and exciting experience to see your cat being judged by the "experts". Even though you may not win you have the satisfaction of knowing it took a very fine cat to win over your entry. And, too, there is always a next time, and, someday will come the time when your cat takes home the blue ribbon—that will be the day you are thankful that you kept going to the shows and long will be cherished in your memories.

You may be in an area of the Country where it is possible for you to join a club and thus become an actual part of a show. If you do not live in such an area and want to attend a show, you will find in every issue of CATS from now until January and February the dates and places of many fine shows throughout the year. Select the ones that suit both yourself and your cats the best and write to the listed show secretary for the necessary entry blanks and show rules. After receiving the blanks, send them back completely filled out together with the required entry fees; and ask the secretary to send you a confirmation on your entries, for if it is lost or mislaid it can be embarrassing to both you and the officers of the show. This can be very disheartening if you have traveled a long distance to get there.

A Cat Show consists of more than the average person would readily know if he had not attended such an event. It is the result of long, careful planning on the part of many who have an earnest desire to make known to all, the best cats that are in the various associations. In a sense it is a fellowship of those who have something common in their interest in cat breeding, all sharing each others' joys and heartaches. Yes, the competition is ever keen, but it is a pleasure for any breeder to see an honestly good cat win.

However, in more particular, a cat show consists of a series of shows all combined into one meeting; an All Breed Show and one or more Specialty Shows. All cats entering any part of the show must first enter the All Breed Show. This includes Longhairs, Short-

hairs, and Domestic cats. The Specialty Shows are of a great variety and include a Solid Color Show for cats of a single color; Silver Specialty Shows for Chinchillas, Silvers, Smokes, and Shaded Silvers; the Siamese Specialty for Siamese; the Foreign Short Hair Specialty for Siamese, Burmese, Abyssinians, Manx, and Russian Blues; and a Tabby and Tortie Specialty for Tabbies of all colors and Torties.

Competent judges are selected from the Associations' qualified judges list prior to the opening of each Cat Show. They are all well-established breeders in their own right and always do a fine conscientious job. It is ever interesting to watch a judge at work as he studies each animal in its particular class, and, excitement is really high when the competition is so close that minor faults must be carefully detected to arrive at a winner. The judging has a definite order; first, kittens are judged, then follow the adult cats, the Champions, and the Grand Champions. A winner is selected for each class from these selections covering all phases of the show, one cat is selected to receive the Best Cat of the Show Award. While all this is going on, one can see on the faces of competing breeders expressions of hope, joy, and yes, quite often, sadness. But to the visitor, the cat judging is entertainment in the highest degree.

Now back to your entry blanks for now that you have heard about a show you surely must want to enter one. In filling out your entry blanks it is important that you have the correct classification for each cat. If you do not know what this classification is, check the show rules book and you will find the correct classification number of each recognized cat. Look on the list for the number that suits your cat.

A cat is a kitten until it passes its eighth month, then it is classed as an adult cat. A cat that has never won a winner's ribbon or has never been shown before is entered in the Novice class.

The name of the cat is important, so be sure to place the full name of your cat in the proper space. If your cat is registered give the correct registration number. It may be stated here that a cat need not be registered to compete in a show, but there will be an additional listing fee for it and you must have it registered for the next show you attend. Championships cannot be claimed if the cat is not registered. Be sure to enter the correct date of birth for your cat and the full names of both the Sire and the Dam.

Next you must list the Specialties in which you wish to have your cat entered. When you have completed this, sign the entry blank on the bottom line designated as such and re-check the blank for

possible errors, making sure that all writing is clear to avoid possible errors on the part of the show secretary.

It is advisable to keep an accurate record of your wins from various shows for this is definitely important when claiming Championships. When you have the required number of points, send the list which will include the date, the show, the judge and the name of the club holding the show to the association recorder who will then verify your wins and send you your championship certificate.

A word of caution must be said concerning the physical condition of all cats taken to shows. Never take a cat that is sick or that has just recovered from an infectious disease. If your cat has not been inoculated for Infectious Enteritis, have this done at least three weeks before the show; and if a long time has elapsed since the inoculation, get your Vet to give it a booster shot. Do not take a cat that has any kind of skin trouble or ear mites for it will transmit the same to others. Be sure that your cat is clean and that both the ears and teeth are in good condition. Another precautionary measure is to have all your cats in a cattery inoculated, for a returning cat from a show may carry an infection though it be in good health. Veterinarians are provided by the show to check all cats coming in and they will refuse entry to any cat in an unhealthy condition.

Before leaving for a show, groom the cats that you are taking because it tends to make them irritable if it is done in a hurry at the showroom. Just a minor touch-up before the judging will make your cat happy and in a receptive mood. Take the necessary equipment to the show such as comb, brush, powder, towels, scissors, Q-tips for the ears, sanitary pan, water cup, and dish. Too, take some canned food with you to feed your animals if necessary. The show provides food but it may be that your cat likes some extra delicacy.

If you are using a public conveyance to attend a show, be careful not to offend a fellow passenger. You may be tired but keep the cats clean at all times and see to it that they are contented and quiet.

In order to make a good impression with your cat it is nice to have pretty curtains and a pillow to place in the cage. This makes an impressive surrounding and will enable the color of your cat to be better shown. Always take good care of your cat in the show room and see to it that you take care of its wants. If possible stay with the cat to see to it that the public knows all about it, and also to keep some misguided people from tormenting the cat.

the air, she looked as if she wore a pair of little black shorts. Her name just seemed to fit her. "Molly" had a friendly manner and we enjoyed her evening calls.

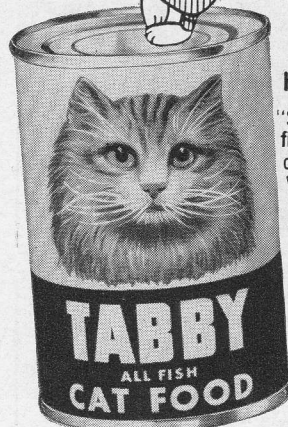

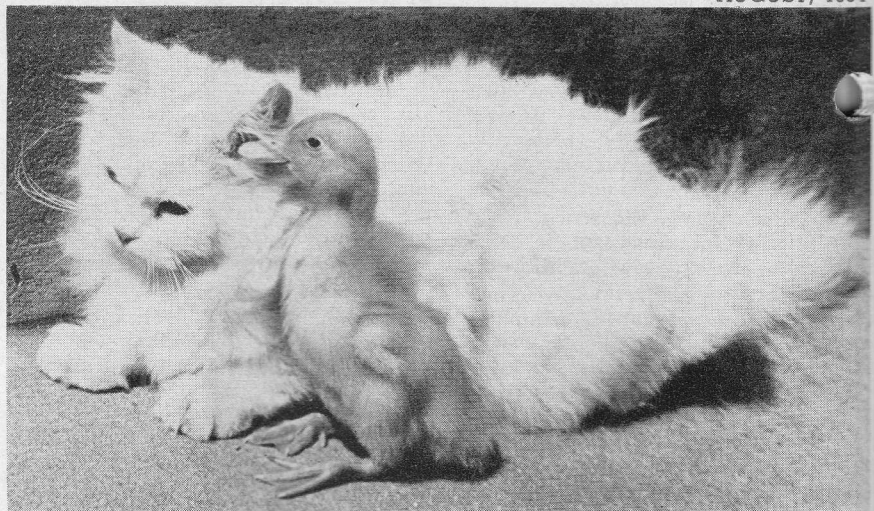
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## "JUST BETWEEN US TWO"

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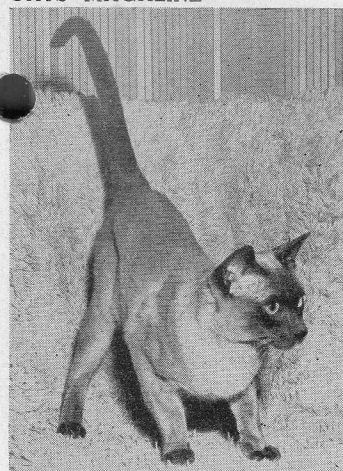

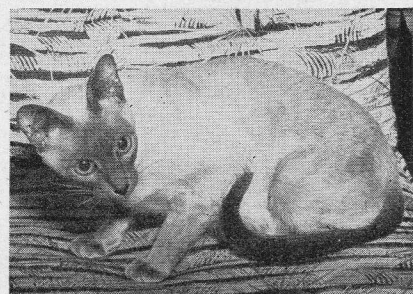
Maopa was obliged to repeat his strategic maneuvers three or four times before Olivia was willing to admit de-

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## FELINE FIELD TRIALS?

I would like to make a suggestion that might arouse more interest in cats, especially with men. I have read lately of "Diggs" being held. From the little I was able to find out about them, they appear to be a kind of "Field Trial" held by groups of Terrier Breeders in an effort to bring the terrier back into his own as a functional dog with a definite purpose in life, and a tremendous asset to his owner and community. In these "Diggs", various terriers, and breeds of terriers, are matched against each other in competition. They are required to dig out and kill rodents of various types, ranging from moles and rats to woodchucks, badgers, gophers and other forms of rodent life, all detrimental to man and his works. The "game" naturally depends on the part of the country in which the meet is held, and the available rodents.

Why should it not be possible to hold a sort of "Field Trial" for outstanding ratters. There are plenty of disgraceful dumps available in suburban and rural villages and townships everywhere, which would provide a fertile field for the display of their talents. The club sponsoring the event would, of course, have to be extremely careful that no exterminators had been around within the last year or so, engaging in their futile attempts to rid the dump of its boarders, or that no town or village official had scattered rat poison about in a half-hearted attempt to control the situation. However, there are hundreds of thousands of such dumps where, all efforts having failed, the taxpayers have simply thrown up their hands and decided that nothing further could be done.

Because of the publicity involved and the benefit to everyone concerned, including the newspapers who would get something really new and unusual in the way of copy, I should think it would be quite easy to get a local businessmen's club or veterans' organization to sponsor a "Field Trial" of this sort. I even have a hunch that the Caterpillar Company could be persuaded to put up some really handsome trophies for the winners, as the resultant publicity would undoubtedly result in a hue and cry being raised over the dump conditions which made such an

event possible, for bulldozers can easily clean up such dump conditions. Nor need the prizes be limited to donations by one company alone, as all the bulldozer manufacturers would benefit, not any one alone. However the association between the name Cat and Caterpillar is obvious, and the advertising potential tremendous.

If this appears to be a plumping for increased sales for Caterpillar, you couldn't be more wrong. What I am really interested in is the tremendous amount of interest in cats it would generate, and particularly the enormous boost it would give the good old "American Short Hair", since most of the superior ratters would be ordinary domestic cats from the farms and homes in the locality. It would raise the cat tremendously in the respect of people who seem to have forgotten that their very existence depends upon his ability to do his job well. It would also lead to more interest in breeding purebred cats and the keeping of pedigrees, in the interest of breeding bigger and better "ratters". In their efforts to improve the hunting qualities of their cats, owners would exercise more care in confining their females during their seasons, and would be more prone to neuter their males to prevent their vanishing during the more active "cat days" of the year—notably February and March, when the mortality rate of Tomcats, either by combat or car, is tremendous. A "Showing" farmer or householder, or even factory or sawmill owner, with three or four good females and a superior stud is not going to risk any cross-ups.

If all this seems silly, just remember that American men have always relished any sort of competition involving animals, as witness the tremendous interest in Beagle and Coonhound trials—both dogs being of breeds ordinarily looked down upon by those fortunate enough to be able to afford the expensive training and care lavished upon the more aristocratic bird dogs. Any farm boy or filling station operator can afford a beagle or coonhound, who may beat the pants off the most expensive dog at the trial, and it requires, not training, but inherent instinct — bred-in-the-bone ability and nose. Hence the great following these breeds have.

Wouldn't it be wonderful to hear some burly male bragging at the corner store about his "18-pound Particolor Short Hair beating the pants off that wedge-faced, block-long son-of-a-Siamese of Bill Jones at the Nationals last week." Something like this would do more to stimulate the public's respect for, and improve the care and treatment of, the American cat than anything since the days of the Pharaohs. It would also follow the American Male to give vent to his actual affection for the cat, something he usually takes great pains to conceal or deny in the mistaken notion that there is something "sissy" about liking cats.

## ALL-SOUTHERNS SELECTED

Leading the seventy-six 1954 All-Southern Cats and the fifty-four Southern Honorable Mentions announced in this issue of CATS Magazine are Mrs. Richard O'Donovan's Seal Point Siamese female Double Grand Champion Chirn Sa-hai Nee-ang who will carry the South's hopes for Cat-of-the-Year honors and Miss Verner Clum's Blue Longhair whose recent death came as a blow to all the Fancy, Triple Grand Champion Moonbeam of Gaylands (Imp.) Nee-ang is the only Double Grand Champion Siamese and Moonbeam the only Triple Grand Champion Blue in the Cat Fancy. Following in order are the eight other highest-scorers: Dbl. Ch. Chirn Sa-hai Ricki, Ch. Chewanna's Sweet Sentiment, Dbl. Ch. Texas Valiant Prince, Milky Way Doll of Silver Moth, West Allis Annette, Ch. Longhill's Tres Chic of Flagstone, Normont's Sandman, and Akanta's Mr. Quarternote of FarFin.

The complete listing starts on page 15, and on pages fourteen through twenty-one will be found announcements by many of the owners of these outstanding cats giving their names and addresses, and showing photographs of many of the winners.

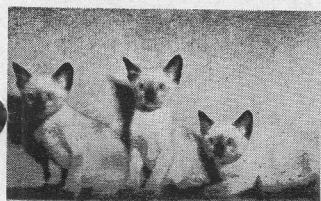
Geographical competition was keen this year—Texas with twenty-five All-Southerns and thirteen Honorable Mentions taking top honors from Florida which claimed nineteen All-Southerns and fourteen H-M's. Louisiana with eleven and twelve; Maryland, nine and five; and Kentucky seven and two; were followed by Tennessee, two and one; Georgia, one and four; and Virginia, one and one. Alabama posted one All-Southern, and the District of Columbia two Honorable Mentions.

The longest continuous All-Southern record is claimed by Normont's Angelique whose first of her five awards was gained in 1950. She has also gained All-American each of these past four years. The farm's Boo To was All-Southern and All-American in both 1948 and 1952, while Triple Champion Elco's Rudolpho gained A-S and A-A in 1951, 1952, and 1953, and Ch. Shawnee Copper Lustre was chalking up a 1951 A-S and 1952 A-S and A-A. Tpl. Gr. Ch. Moonbeam was A-S in both 1952 and 1953 and A-A and O.S. Cat of the Year in 1953 while Normont's Charm and Dbl. Ch. Floridanus Tangelo were A-S and A-A both years. Dunloe Yanya of Flomar was A-S '52, and A-S, A-A '53, and Ch. Chewanna's Sweet Sentiment was 1950 and 1951 All-Midwestern.

West Allis Annette was 1952 All-Midwestern and All-American, while Tpl. Ch. Rusty of Ri-Bo gained All-Western and All-American awards for that year. Dbl. Ch. Carron of Glen Orry was a 1952 A-S and A-A winner and Nor-Mont's Sandman gained the All-Southern ribbon then, too. 1953 All-Southern and All-American winners present in this year's listing are: Ch. Dixi-Land Banner of Windibank, Ch. Longhill's Tres Chic of Flagstone, Dbl. Ch. Flagstone's Play Girl, Garvinia's Sissy of Polychrome, Ch. Shawnee Masquerade, Dbl. Ch. Chirn Sa-hai Ricki, and the farm's Tee Tan.

Dbl. Gr. Ch. Chirn Sa-hai Nee-ang, Ch. Coventry's Bambey-Ling of Vanar, Dbl. Ch. Vanar's Ptola, Dbl. Ch. Tyoh der Captain, Ch. Gryffin, Dbl. Ch. Las Montanas Walkie Talkie, Ch. Bonnie Wee Lad of Flagstone, Dbl. Ch. Palatka Smokie Joe, Dbl. Ch. Floridanus Misty Moonlight and Dbl. Ch. Silver Moth Price Necho all earned 1953 All-Southern ribbons.

With the All-Southern listing, the naming of the 1954 All-Sectional cats comes to a close and the stage is set for the announcement of the 1954 All-American Cats in the September issue of CATS Magazine. The All-American cat for each breed, sex, and color will be the highest-scoring of the four All-Sectional cats previously named. The American Honorable Mention cats will be the second highest-scoring cats nationally in each breed, sex, and color, with both All-Sectional and Sectional Honorable Mention cats being eligible to compete.



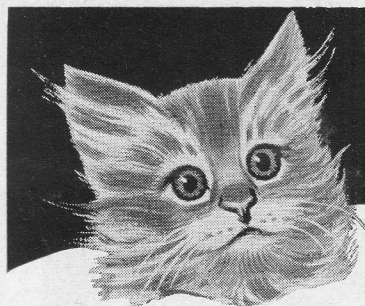
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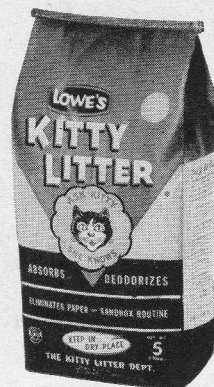
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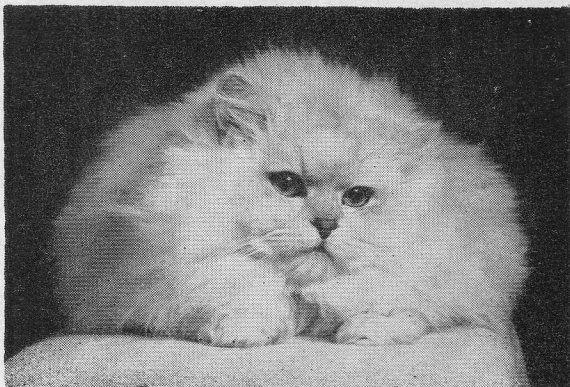
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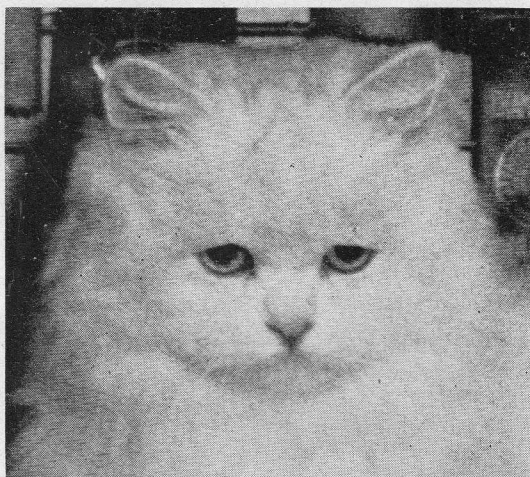

Our wins for the season—some of them at least: Best Cat four times, Best Opposite five; Best Shorthair eleven times, Best Opposite ten; Best Abyssinian fourteen times, Best Opposite five; Best Siamese eleven times; Best Opposite seven; Best Seal Point thirteen times; Best Opposite nine; Best Champion six times; Best Opposite four. We finished six CFA championships and many were almost finished—passed the fifty mark for championships on Chirn Sa-hai bred or owned cats. ## Cats Question Box

Conducted by E. A. Renaux, D. V. M.

Is it safe to give narcotics to cats to quiet them? My reason for asking is that the last time I took my cat to a veterinarian for a series of inoculations (it was to leave the country), he got excited, and I still bear a horrible scar from where he scratched me.

Mrs. M. H. F., Fort Benning, Ga.

*It is not advisable to give narcotics to cats. Sometimes they will react violently to them and are worse off than with nothing. If absolutely necessary, about the safest type of drug would be one of the barbiturates, about 1/4 grain. This amount shouldn't make the cat 'dopey' at all, but should be just enough to take some of the extreme excitability away.*

*Regarding this question of narcotics, it might be well to point out that paregoric should not be used to check diarrhea in cats. Also, many cough preparations have morphine or similar narcotics in them that will have a tendency to greatly upset a cat.*

We have a Seal Point Siamese family—beautiful and intelligent. The kits are unusually alert; the male is a very lovable and handsome fellow. I often wish I could get a picture when he is making over his family or cuddled up among them for a nap.

But—I am having trouble this spring with him "spraying" the furniture. What is the best thing to do to cure this. Will training (watching and scolding) help to stop this habit if habit it is?

—Mrs. R. S. H., Lebanon, Ind.

*I'm sorry, but to correct a male cat from spraying is usually not a happy decision for most people to make. The only really satisfactory way is the altering of the offending individual.*

Can you tell me why my Siamese Seal Point should be getting light tan hairs in his black face. Is there any reason for this, and is there anything that can be done to regain the all-black face?

—Mrs. H. D. M.—Baltimore 28, Md.

*There could be several reasons for the changing of the hair color in the face: age, treatment with one of the antibiotics, and possible vitamin deficiency. If there has been any penicillin or aureomycin given recently, cortisone may help to correct the condition. Other than that, the giving of the vitamin B. Complex and especially pantothenic acid could be of some value.*

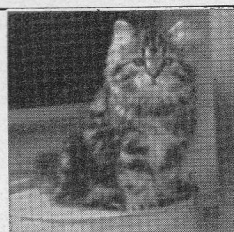

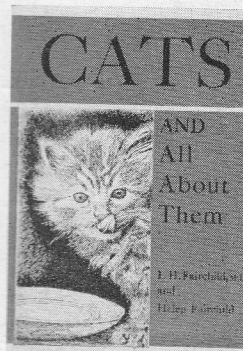

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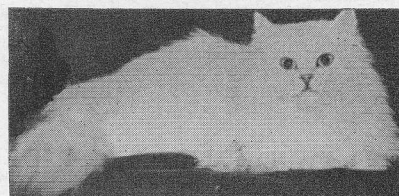
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## Mews and Views from the West

Correction from last column. Mrs. George Day phoned to say that Byne's WuLing of Su Chi, IMP, is very much at home at their cattery, and does not reside at Rae-O-Lee Cattery. The newspaper article printed it wrong, so for you interested readers he is still available in these parts.

Be sure to see that the pregnant mother and the nursing mother has calcium added to her diet, along with your A and D vitamins.

One Doll—namely, Dbl. Champion Casa Contenta Easter Doll, Chinchilla female, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Nestor Barrett of San Jose - made head lines in the San Jose News. I have before me the daily column captioned *Share It With Barrett*, written by Dick Barrett, telling about the flying trips of Doll to Minneapolis, where she was judged Best Opposite Sex Cat, and to New Orleans where she took high honors also. He further states that Mrs. Van Zele of Lemon Grove, who agented Doll, wanted to send her home via United Air Lines, but found that Doll might have a long layover in a drafty terminal in Los Angeles, so she telephoned Southwest Airways in L. A. to make arrangements. Southwest said Doll should check in an hour before flight time.

Mrs. Van Zele boarded an American Air Lines Ship at San Diego with Doll and arrived in L. A. just before the Southwest plane was to leave. Southwest waived the one-hour requirement and held up its plane while Doll was *raced*, from one end of the terminal to another. Doll has now presented her proud owners with five Silver kittens, three boys and two girls, sired by Dbl. Ch. Charmente of Purr Mew, owned by Mrs. Robert Hare of Paradise, California. I have before me the picture of this litter which looks most promising.

Mr. and Mrs. L. Celeste of Houston, Texas owns Ke-Hala, Blue Point female whose life she owes to household pet Patches. Last December Ke-Hala had a healthy litter of kits, but one after another died. It took twelve days for all the kits to die. The vet diagnosed it as some kind of poisoning. Mrs. Celeste noticed Ke-Hala failing too, so she went to the pound and found a very healthy looking cat, Patches - and a blood transfusion was given Ke-Hala from Patches, 35 cc the 1st time, 20 cc a short time later, and then another 10 cc, and after the third transfusion the vet, Dr. A. I. Flowers of Houston, felt Ke-Hala was out of danger. After the final transfusion it appeared Patches would not survive, and was immediately given artificial respiration and within two minutes he was all right. The second day after the transfusion Ke-Hala was eating and within five days she was full of play. Mrs. Celeste feels without this transfusion, and of course the careful nursing she gave her, Ke-Hala would not have survived. Needless to say Patches has a happy home for life, and at the Houston show was Best Opp. Sex household pet, and was the cause of much hero worshipping. I hope this experience might help to save the life of some other valuable pet.

It is good to see kits romping again at the Hollywood Cattery, after seeing

only one spay for a period of time (Hollywood Champagne). Hollywood Krysette, Blue Point female, has three B. P. kits, one exceptionally fine female, and two beautiful boys, sired by Ch. Velvet Mask Dauntless (Imp), owned by Mars Hanson.

I have a note from Mrs. Genvieve M. Gibson, announcing *The Eastern Cat Fanciers (ACA)* will hold a *One Day Show*, September 23th in the National Guard Armory at Media, Pa. There will be an All Breed, a Long Hair and Short Hair Specialty. I will be anxious to hear how successful this will be, from the standpoint of exhibitors, who will not have to be away from home so long, and gate receipts.

In the last issue of *Cats* I read with interest the fine article written by Blanche Wolf from *Tips To The Novice From A Novice* - From my experience, though, and I have verified it with my vet, I feel that if it is necessary to assist the mother in cutting the umbilical cord, it should be cut about *one and one-half* inches from the Kitten, as it is possible three-fourths of an inch could be too short and might cause the kitten to bleed to death.

I was very sorry to hear beautiful and beloved Tpl. Gr. Ch. Moonbeam of Gayland's (Imp) had died. He had been sold by Miss Verner E. Clum to Mrs. K. Hills of Ambridge, Pennsylvania. He was taken ill on a Monday and died on a Thursday, much too young for this fine light blue sire. Miss Clum writes "he was not just a cat, but a person whom you were privileged to know."

I have before me Vol. 1 of *Garden State News*, which is to be published quarterly with a subscription rate of 50c per year. It is very newsworthy and if interested about their activities get in touch with Mrs. Robert Bird, Editor 200 Claremont Avenue, Verona, New Jersey.

In looking over some rather old cat publications which were given me by Mrs. Eva T. Harris, well known breeder of Barbe Blues, I find some pertinent facts about blacks. In *The Western Cat Fancier*, dated January, 1916 - I find a Mrs. Mangley Porter had this to say: "A black kitten, up to the age of six months, and sometimes older, is often every color but black. If the coat color on the chest, belly and shoulders is sound black to the roots - we can feel pretty sure it will be a good black. But a bluish or grey shade is not good. White hairs in the ears after three months are not good. A few white hairs scattered in the black coat are usually shed out. Any black with a white locket should never be kept. One of the first lessons the novice must learn is to weed out all kittens not up to standard. All breeding stock must be the best color and type obtainable. We delude ourselves into thinking that blue under coat is not so bad, or a smoky ruff can be overlooked, but the general cry is 'you never get real black anyway'. I wouldn't want a creamy white, or a rusty shade of blue - why then be satisfied with an imperfect black?"

The article further states: "A few

## Fanciers Forum

### ONE-DAY SHOWS

The Siamese Breeders Guild planned a one day show last fall, yet despite the enthusiastic response of potential exhibitors, it failed to be realized, but the movement was begun and at least three one-day shows have been scheduled for this season.

Perhaps the comparison with dog shows may illustrate the weak places in the two-day cat shows, and point up the advantages in the one-day show, using dog shows as set up by the American Kennel Club as a precedent.

Why do they do it and how do they do it in one day?

Top officials agree that the dog fanciers insist on the one-day shows, as they want to reach the show and return to their homes in time for business as usual on Monday.

There are about 750 shows per season, each week-end all year around. Then there are the circuits where one may do eight shows in two weeks, if one doesn't mind travelling 1800 miles, such as Connecticut to North Carolina. Only a few shows take up two days, as do the Westminster Kennel Club, which has as many as 3,000 entries, and the International Kennel Club in Chicago.

No ring is idle. There is no intermission. There may be as many as twenty judges. Judges are limited to 150 dogs. Many judges give their services gratis, and are paid expenses. The average fee is \$125. The maximum fee is \$250 for top all-breed judges, but expenses are not paid. There are 109 thoroughbred breeds registered by AKC.

In February, an AKC dog show was held in the New Haven, Connecticut, for one day, and there were over 800 entries, however, the show started at ten A.M. and was finished between eight and nine P.M. by fourteen judges.

Besides the factor of time saved, there is a saving in money. Hotel rooms aren't necessary, nor is time off from regular employment. Only one day's garage or parking bills and only one day's meals.

Cat shows average two judges, an all-breed judge and a specialty judge. Large shows, 250 to 350 cats, may have 3 or 4 judges, but the all-breed judge handles every one of the cats. That is where shows are held up. Exhibitors often leave the show room after midnight not knowing the wins, which haven't been concluded, so they must wait to read them months later in the magazines.

Today shows do not start promptly even on the second morning. There are long waits for lunch and for dinner.

Taking a leaf from the AKC's book of tricks, let's have more cat shows, often as every week, but may they be one-day shows.

Dog shows are more complicated than cat shows. Dogs must be seen in action, must be walked around, some must prove obedience. Yet they accomplish this work

on time in one day.

Let's have more judging going on at the same time, with more judges working at the same show, with either fees or expenses paid, but not both.

### MORE ON GLAMORE

The article "Let's Glamorize Our Cat Shows" by Elizabeth Roberts in the December issue of "CATS" was most enjoyed and helpful. Our club had a show coming up and I could see my beautiful (to me, anyway) Siamese against backgrounds of velvet or satin drapes. My enthusiasm was soon doomed to despair, for beautiful backgrounds for eleven cages meant an expense I was afraid to even estimate.

A canary is at home in a wire cage but a bare cage seems a punishment for a cat. While nothing is needed or can improve the looks of a well-bred and healthy cat, silks, satins and velvets of royalty are their deserved environment; or so I thought.

But it isn't the material used so much as the soft hues of color for their background. This I achieved for approximately sixty cents per single cage. There is a paper product stocked by paper supply firms for display work in stores, posters and various merchandise exhibits. It is a corrugated heavy paper on another heavy one-inch scored back and is stocked in a number of colors and tints. It can be cut into the desired length and width and is easily decorated with borders or cut-outs of another shade or color by means of an ordinary stapler. It is easily rolled and put in the cage door and set up around the three sides. And there you have a lovely background for your pride and joy; and in a flash too! In the next show I will fasten the four corners to the cage with soft wire but that is a minor operation. Of the eleven backgrounds I used, only three were discarded at the end of the show.

This form of decoration will meet a number of needs. For one thing, it protects the cat from drafts and to a certain extent shuts out the odor of the strange cat in the next cage. Many exhibitors travel hundreds of miles in an automobile and rather than travel with soiled drapery, will discard yards of expensive material. The paper background may be discarded at far less cost than most any material. Quite a number of the backgrounds, cut to cage size and decorated if desired, may be rolled together and will take very little space when traveling.

The interest shown in this type of decoration was so favorable that I believe the readers of "CATS" may be interested in glamor for a minimum of expense and labor. The product which I used is "Win-do-dec", manufactured by The Auax Box Company, Chicago, Illinois.

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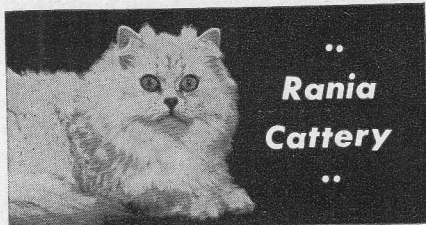

things for a novice to avoid - *damp runs or damp air*, which will rust a black more quickly than all the California sunshine. Severe grooming at shedding time *must* be done. A chamois cloth will be found much better than a brush, and will, with a steel comb, keep the black coats in lovely condition. Black cats should have a black or very dark blanket in their quarters; this, you will laugh or smile at, but nevertheless try it."

I hope to see many, many pictures in the *All-American* issue of the cats who will receive the much sought after *All-American* awards.

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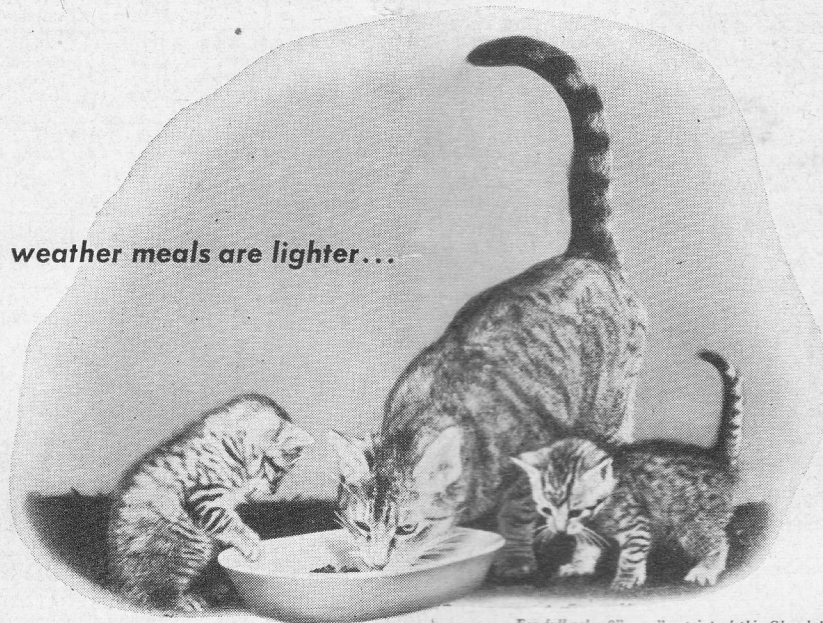
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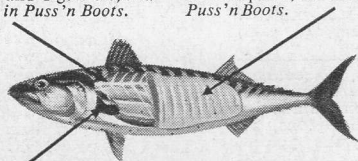


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
