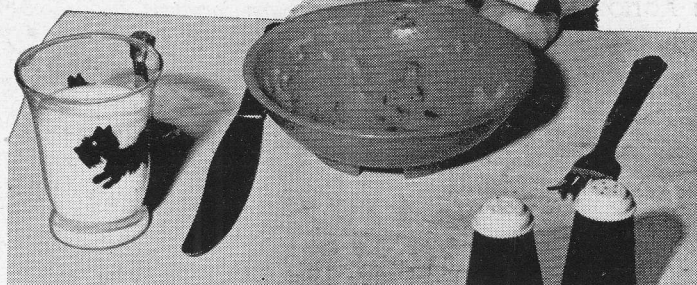

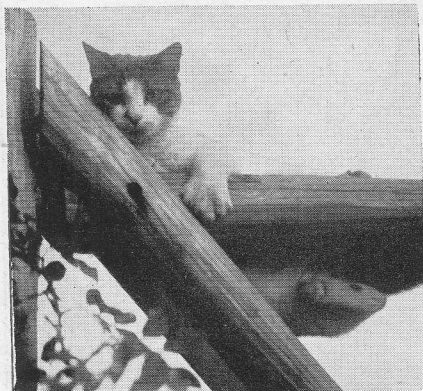

Are terribly easy to start.*

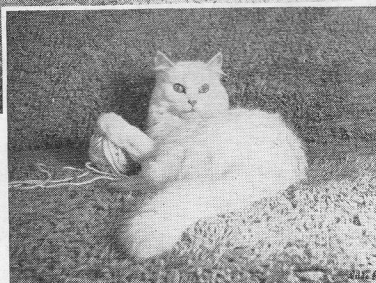
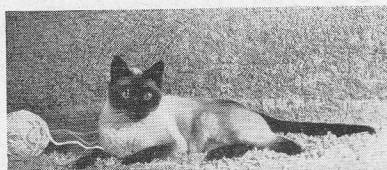
*There's a new little kitten who's taken

1954 CAT PICTURE OF THE YEAR

The climax of the 1954 Picture of the Month and Picture of the Year Contests was the selection by the judges of the photograph used on our cover this month as the 1954 Cat Picture of the Year—the finest submitted during the entire contest period.

The \$100 United States Bond awarded by the makers of 3 Little Kittens, co-sponsors of the contest, goes to Ken Clark, 2178 Sixth Avenue, Morton, Pennsylvania, for this "Brothers Under the Fur", a fine study of two kittens, a Tabby and a Black Domestic Shorthair peeking out of their blanket bed. Thousands of entries from all over the world were carefully studied by the contest officials before Mr. Clark's two lovable little boys won out by the proverbial cat's whisker.

Mr. Clark, who loves both animals and photography, provides the wherewithal for cat food and photo supplies by working as a tool designer for Piasecki Helicopter Company in Morton, but he finds plenty of time for his hobbies, too, as is evidenced by his winning the "Print of the Year" awards of the Delaware County Cat Club the past two seasons with (sssh!) pictures of his dogs which he likes equally as well as cats. Both he says are far preferable to people as photographic subjects—something with which many photographers agree.

The prize-winning picture was taken by open strobe using a 4x5 Brand 17 camera. The lights in the room were dimmed, the camera focused on the kittens' bed and stopped down to f.32. Then the shutter set on "bulb" was reopened for an instant, the strobe flashed, and the shutter closed. Mr. Clark had planned the shot for some time, and it was only by great good luck that the kits finally assumed just the pose he was looking for, and for which the contest judges, too, were apparently searching.

OUR TWO CIRCUS CATS

The bright white sun shone down on me as I crossed the square of the ringstock department at the Sarasota winter quarters of The Greatest Show On Earth. I had just come from the big top, where the circus girls were rehearsing for the coming season. Dick Barstow, known to the circus kids as "NP," had dismissed the girls for lunch; and as they proceeded to cookhouse, I went off to get the sandwich I had left, along with my sweater, in the stall of Cloud and Flash, my favorite white horses.

Bill Karr was sitting on a bale of hay, talking to the horses as I came in. This in itself was remarkable, for usually he is fussing around with his charges rather than sitting, unless, of course, he is reading the paper. Bill got up and went off to get us some coffee, while I settled myself in the red wooden chair and unwrapped my sandwich. I ate a few bites, nice and slowly, and was about to take another when Bill came in, handed me my coffee, and sat down, saying "Well, old momma cat's gone."

"Oh dear," I exclaimed, "what happened?"

"Got kicked by a horse, I guess," replied Bill, calmly accepting fate, as is his way.

"Oh, I'm sad about that poor thing," I said. "Golly, she was such a meek, mild little gal, such a nice cat." Then, suddenly remembering, I asked "What about the kittens?"

"She hid 'em," Bill said, "no one knows where, but I think they're down behind the wood pile where we can't get 'em."

I chewed all this over in my mind as I chewed my lunch, remembering the day momma cat had come in and lain down at my feet like a dog, not asking anything of me except the right to be near. This thought made me very sad. Maybe she wasn't much of a cat, small and gray and meek, but she was a good old girl for all of that. Most of the year she lived on mice and rats around winter-quarters. Occasionally, she would be favored with a few scraps of meat, but this no longer mattered, for now she was gone and her new-born kittens would starve to death.

The thought of the kittens' fate haunted me all the rest of the day and gave me a very restless night. I went out to quarters the next morning with the firm idea of trying to get Bill to help me find the kittens and at least try to save them, even though I knew the chances of success were not very good.

But when I arrived at the stables I found, to my joy, that my worrying had been needless. With the help of the God Who notes the sparrow's fall and Doc Henderson, the circus vet, and a lot of natural willpower to live, momma cat was still alive—a very sick cat, but still living. Bill had trailed her and found where the kittens were: they had been born under the feed box of one of the horses, a horse named Cookie, in fact

they had been born only a few inches under a horse's nose.

Bill took me to see the cat family. Momma cat was lying in the hay with a great, gaping hole in her side; but she opened her eyes when we drew the covering hay aside and she looked up at Bill with perfect faith: here was help instead of hurt. Bill fished around and pulled out from behind her a tiny black and white scrap of fur and handed it to me. It had little pink feet and its eyes were tight shut. Later, we named the small thing Damoo, but now, as I had my first look at him, he was not even as long as my hand.

A second kitten, a gray tiger like his mother, was given into my arms next. We later named this one Timmy. The other three—for there were five of them—were white with gray spots.

The name "Damoo" I chose in compliment to Damoo de Hotre, one of my favorite lion trainers. His full name is "Damoo Gesinta Barnum." Timothy was named later for the timothy hay in which he was born, his full name being "Timothy Hay Bailey." I don't know if the other three all were little boys, but maybe they could be the Ringling Bros. At any rate, I can say that Barnum and Bailey now live with me in Washington.

Momma cat lay in the stall under the feed box for days, being fed scraps from cookhouse by Bill and his ringstock friends. The kittens nursed and grew strong. Bit by bit, momma cat got better. When I marvelled at her still being alive with such a wound—and I often did—Bill would shrug and say: "With all those kittens to raise she was just too busy to die," and I guess he was right. Still the whole situation was almost enough to make me believe the old saying about cats having nine lives.

I visited the kittens every morning, and, out of respect for momma cat's valiant spirit, decided to adopt at least one of her children and take it home to the Nation's Capital with me. Damoo had been handed to me first; besides he was like his father. (Damoo's father had adopted Bill when he was still a young cat. During the day he could almost always be found sleeping in the stall that is the home of Cloud and Flash, Bill's charges and my favorites with the show.) So it was Damoo I chose. But Timmy was the cuter kitten. When one of my friends, Dorothy, came down from Washington for a visit, I tried to get her to take Timmy—although she did

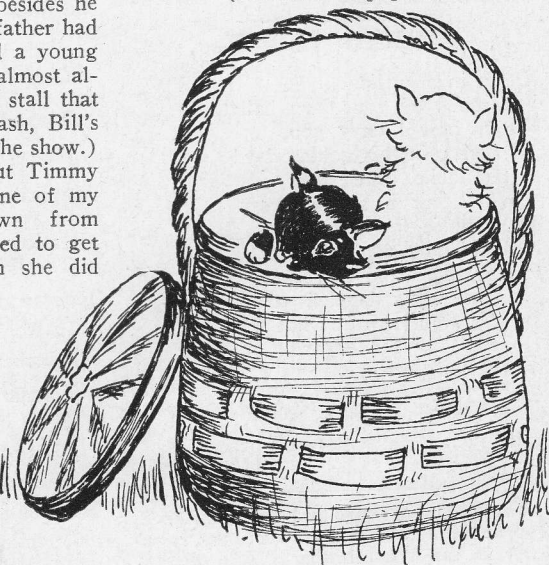

have a cat, a dog, a bird and some fish already. It would have worked too, but Dorothy's son said no to the idea. So, of course, I wound up with both Damoo and Timmy. And, believe me, I'm not at all sorry.

The kittens grew and opened their eyes. Bill and I both were filled with pride at how cute they were, and I got into the habit of bringing momma cat bits of food from town. This meant that my lunch bag now held a can of cat food in addition to my peanut butter sandwich and orange. A few people thought this quite odd, but to me it was all very reasonable, since I was feeding my kittens in a round-about sort of way. Now and then I took a kitten out to watch rehearsals. When momma cat was almost well, we moved the whole family into an empty stall. Living in a stall, I claim, is responsible for the cats not being quite sure whether they aren't horses at times: they gallop like horses when they run.

Hundreds of children stopped to pet the kittens during those weeks. And the show girls came in from time to time to rub a furry head. If anyone complained that the kittens had fleas, Bill would say firmly: "Why, they're big enough to have a flea."

The warm Sarasota days passed quickly: soon it was time for the show to go out on the road, time for me to head for my Washington home. I acquired a brightly ornamented fruit basket to carry the kittens in. The idea was that the train conductor would think I was carrying oranges, apples and other good things to eat. The basket went with me to quarters and I let the kittens play in it to get used to it. Late one afternoon, the last rehearsal over, I dashed into the stall and put my kittens in the basket as momma cat stood by. I explained to her about Washington and giving the kittens a good home, and she seemed to understand, for she placidly went in to lick her other three children. Except for a slight limp, she was completely well again.

The next morning I boarded the train and waved goodbye to circus friends who

SHE CAME TO STAY

The cat was undoubtedly domesticated earlier than the dog. This does not give her any particular tenure of rights; both of them have shared the fortunes and misfortunes of man for many a long millennium. It is merely an historical point based on an assumption. Man trained his early dogs to hunt with him and before he could have attempted such a partnership, he would have had to overcome his own fear of wild dogs and at the same time, he would have needed the dog's help. Certainly, he could have hunted alone, as he did without the dog, and as man formed societies with other men and women, they could have watched the fires themselves and maintained their own guard against night marauders. After primitive man got the dog, he operated more efficiently and slept more soundly at night, but before he got the dog, the cat must have come to him with a simple, tacit proposition. She would keep the mice and rats away in exchange for a warm spot to rest and a few scraps to eat. She made it easy for man to settle down and develop his agriculture. She made the granary possible. And, she made it clear to him that cats could live with humans, so perhaps he took the hint and tried a similar agreement with the dog.

Once her value was established, the cat became a rather important figure. The Phoenicians traded Egyptian cats in Italy where they secured a good exchange in other valuable commodities. In subsequent years, her value declined but the language of commerce still uses some old references to the cat. "It's in the bag," meaning the deal is clinched, refers to an old trick. Cats were often substituted in the sale of suckling pigs. At Medieval fairs, the country bumpkin came to buy his pig, which was put in a sack for him, but while he was not looking, a cat was substituted. If the seller succeeded in the ruse, the deal was "in the bag". If he failed, someone must have "let the cat out of the bag". We say, "Don't buy a pig in a poke" but the French retain the older form and say, "Don't buy a cat in a bag". The words "pocket" and "pocketbook" come from this old French expression, "*Acheter chat en poche*".

The French also say, "Leave the sleeping cat alone" while we say, "Let sleeping dogs lie." Emphasis in the French expression is more concerned with comfort; it says to let well enough alone, whereas our emphasis seems to lie in not looking for trouble. We say, "To call a spade, a spade"; but the French "call a cat, a cat". An amusing expression in France, "To carry away the cat" means to leave without paying the bill. A German metaphor for carefully planned strategies deals with the way "a cat gets to the broth". We are indebted to the Germans for the dubious thought that "all cats are grey by night" and they have a good metaphor for people's inability to go against their natural in-

clinations. We use the Biblical proverb, "The Leopard doeth not change his spots" whereas the Germans say, "The cat cannot leave the mouse alone".

The source of the musical cat in the nursery rhyme, "Hey Diddle Diddle" would seem to come from the famous English pub, "The Cat and the Fiddle", but the name of the pub is, itself, a transitional corruption from the French. The pub was named originally for one of the governors of Calais, who was called "*Caton, le fidele*" or the faithful Caton.

The English have enriched our language with many references that come from their awareness of the cat. They noticed a somewhat abstract similarity between the mother cat and her kittens, and a large kettle surrounded by little pots. Because of this, pewter pots became known as "kitties" and in card games, when the pot was placed on the table for the ante, the name "kitty" as a synonym for the poker pot has continued to endure. In many games, there are cat references. A child lets the momentum of a swing become motionless and calls it, "Letting the cat die". On playground parallel bars, twirling children are playing a game called, "Skin the Cat," and because of the numerous ways to twist and turn, this gives rise to another saying: "There are more ways than one . . ."

The child's game played with string, is called "cat's cradle" from another strange misuse of French. It was originally: *creche*; the manger which held the Christ-child.

Waiting to see which way the cat will jump, has an almost double beginning. In American politics it was tied in with "sitting on the fence to see which way the cat would jump". Both of these expressions: "Sitting on the fence" and "Waiting to see which way the cat will jump" have endured independently of each other. James Russell Lowell used the former in "The Biglow Papers" with his line, "A kind o' hangin' 'round an' settin' on the fence". The latter is found in English sports with the game, Tipcat, in which a stick is batted between two teams. This stick is called "the cat" and the alert player springs around waiting to see "which way the cat will jump".

Fables have given our language other terms. From the story of the monkey who used the cat's paw to pull the chest-

nuts out of the fire, we have the continued idea of getting someone else to do the dirty work. The term "cat's paw" has quite a different meaning in nautical terms. At sea, the cat's paw is a ripple on calm waters.

Aesop's tale of the mice who wanted to hang a bell on the cat was reflected in Scotch history when James III elevated his chief architect to the nobility as Earl of Mar. At a secret meeting, the other nobles agreed that the new Earl of Mar must be killed and the question was raised, "Who will hang the bell on the cat?" When Archibald, Earl of Angus agreed to do it and later captured his victim, hanging him outside the castle gate, he earned an historic title as "Archibald, Bell-the-Cat".

Elsewhere in Scotch lore is the strange motto of the Clan McPherson, "Touch not the cat, but the glove". This refers to the only wild cats found in the British Isles, in the Highlands of Scotland, which is also the area of the Clan McPherson. They proudly identified themselves with these fierce little animals and their motto is intended to mean that it is as dangerous to meddle with the McPhersons as it is to stir up the wild cats.

Most large cities in the English-speaking world have a Kit Cat Club. Few know that there was actually a man named Christopher Cat who invented the mutton pie. He called them "Kit Cats" and later opened a private restaurant in London, the original Kit Cat Club. The ceiling was so low that when it was decided to hang portraits on the wall, a new size for paintings had to be devised. They were called Kit Cat portraits. Technically, the size of a Kit Cat portrait should be twenty-eight by thirty-six inches in a three-quarter likeness. Among the famous people at this Seventeenth Century meeting place, painted in Kit Cat portraits were Addison, Steele, Congreve and Walpole.

Clearly, man has carefully observed the cat and used her attitudes, her character, and at times, the basic mystery of her manners to enrich his language. Sometimes, he has been mistaken. Curiosity has seldom killed a cat. At other times, he has been almost as wise as the cat, herself. When he calls that watchful half-sleep, a "cat nap", he proves his own poetic capacity. They will endure together, the man and the cat. She would not have it otherwise.

TIPS TO THE NOVICE FROM A NOVICE



Finding a
Stud Cat
for Your
Queen

So you purchased a cute little kitten. You took very special care of it and watched it grow from kittenhood through the awkward period and now it has reached full maturity. What was once a cute little princess is now a beautiful queen, and, my, how proud you are of her! Everything has been going along fine until one day she is acting unlike she has ever acted before. She is constantly at your side demanding affection. Then you notice that she goes through some peculiar antics; rolling on the floor, creeping around with her front legs low and hind legs high. And as if this is not enough, she begins to make the most weird noises as though great pain has overtaken her. Well, about this time you begin to think that there is something wrong with her, and your first impulse is to get to the telephone and make an appointment with your local veterinarian. What did he tell you was wrong with her? Why, of course, and you didn't even suspect what was happening—nature is just taking its course and the little girl is in "season". Now she wants to have little babies of her own and you are faced with the problem of getting a suitable mate for her. Just what are you going to do about it? Perhaps I can be of help!

Your Queen Matures

If this is the first time that your queen has come in season, it is a good idea to do nothing at all as far as a mate is concerned, just letting the period pass. She is probably a bit too young at this time to have kittens. Her vital organs, while they are very much grown, are not yet fully developed and if a mating takes place permanent injury to the cat may be a result. Keep her indoors until she goes out of season lest you find yourself blessed with some nondescript looking kittens sired by some "back-fence" Tom. It is best to wait until your cat is at least a year old before mating her for the first time. By then she will have fully developed and will be able to bear her babies. There are exceptions, as some queens will be strong enough at ten months to be mated, but twelve months is a good general rule.

Cats are entirely irregular as far as the frequency of their period is concerned. Each time of season lasts from three to seven days. If a cat is not mated she may return in season in about four weeks but this depends on the particular cat. Some females seem to be in season constantly due to the fact that their periods are so close together, again,

depending on the particular cat.

During the times the cats are in season they often refuse to eat and nothing you can give them makes any difference. This can pull the weight of a cat down if she comes in season quite regularly, but for some reason or other nature meant for a cat not to eat while in season for the chances of its being bred are better if the cat is hungry. Make sure that the queen you are going to breed is not too fat. When a female is too heavy, fat collects around the ovaries thus preventing the eggs from being discharged. A short period without food is not enough to remedy this, so keep the girl in trim shape.

Spring, when the warm breezes take away the cold of winter and all of the world takes on new life, is the best time in which to breed your queen, for the kittens will have the warm weather of summer in which to thrive. Breeding in the late fall should be avoided because of the following cold weather. It is usually advisable to limit the breeding to once a year, for this will assure more healthy and stronger kittens. However, if your girl produced only one or two kittens and they were weaned early, another mating would not harm her. Then, too, there is the queen that is larger and stronger than the average, where you can use your judgment as to how often she can be bred without impairing her health.

"Making Arrangements"

If you live close to a stud cat whose services you plan to use, take your female to him after the first day to allow for a couple of days for them to become acquainted and still leave time for mating. If it is going to be necessary to ship her for stud service, plan to do this so that she arrives at the destination a few days before her next period begins.

Should you not know with whom your little girl should be mated, it is a good practice to contact the breeder from whom you purchased your kitten for she will gladly advise you on a suitable mate. If a desirable stud is too far away the breeder may recommend taking your cat to someone nearby, who, in her estimation, would have a stud with equally desirable qualities that would go well with your cat.

Lest you get into something without realizing all of its implications, you should understand that there is a stud fee for mating your cat. Perhaps this fee is a little more than you want to pay, but when you know the cost of maintaining a stud cat you will realize that you are getting stud service very cheaply. This is what keeping a stud cat involves. The breeder must pay all the food bills, veterinarian bills, and maintain separate housing for a stud cat. Many queens must be provided for the stud cat for it is not possible to keep him healthy and happy with one queen. And then there are the shows; the stud must be taken to many of them involving great expense to make him the winner that he is so that

people like yourselves will be sure of getting a very fine stud for your mating. Last but not least is the struggle in actually mating your queen with the stud cat. At home your little darling is the personification of innocence, but away from home in strange surroundings and among strange cats she can easily turn into a holy terror. She may bite, scratch, and, in general, try to tear the male apart. He could be permanently injured by her, for most males are very gentle with females brought to them for mating while the latter often resent the presence of the male. Added to this is the food and care that must be given the queen. The sum total of it all is that it is quite a job to get your cat mated and the breeder in reality is doing you a big favor in helping you to mate the cat.

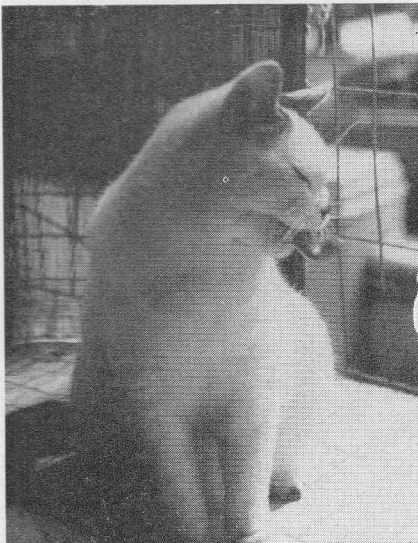
If, when your cat arrives, the breeder thinks that she is not in season, she can either keep her there till the proper time or send her back to you. Sometimes it is cheaper to allow the breeder to board your cat until the next season comes, for the cost of transportation often entails much expense. If your cat was mated and the mating did not turn out to be productive, the breeder will gladly oblige by mating her again without charge. However, do not overdo this because the male will be a proven stud and the female may have some physical reason for not producing. If it is necessary to send a cat to a breeder a third time for a single mating, you surely should compensate the breeder for all the trouble and inconvenience that you are causing. Of course, this is a rare case.

Finding "Mr. Right"

In selecting a stud for your queen you must keep uppermost in your mind the type of cat for which you are breeding. A Persian cat should look solid, low on the legs, deep chested, broad across the shoulders and rump with a short body. Should the cat be large or small, the proportions must still be correct. The head is of good size, well rounded with the skull being broad and the neck short. The ears should not be too large, rounded at the tip, spaced wide apart but not unduly open at the base. The nose should be short and broad but not peked-face unless it is a peked-face cat. The cheeks should be full and the jaw broad and powerful. Good eyes are large, full, of good color with a wide-awake appearance. The tail should be short and full. Paws should be round and firm. The coat must be perfect in conditioning: fine texture, soft, glossy, full of life, and should stand off from the body. Its length should be long all over. The ruff should be immense and continue in a deep frill between the front legs. Ear tufts are long and curved. Toe tufts long and the brush very full.

Your girl's mate should have these qualities if he is to be of great value to you in breeding. Preferably, you should see the stud cat either at its cattery, or at a show, but if neither of these ways are open to you, write to a breeder and ask to be sent photos of the stud cat. Seeing the cat or even seeing pictures

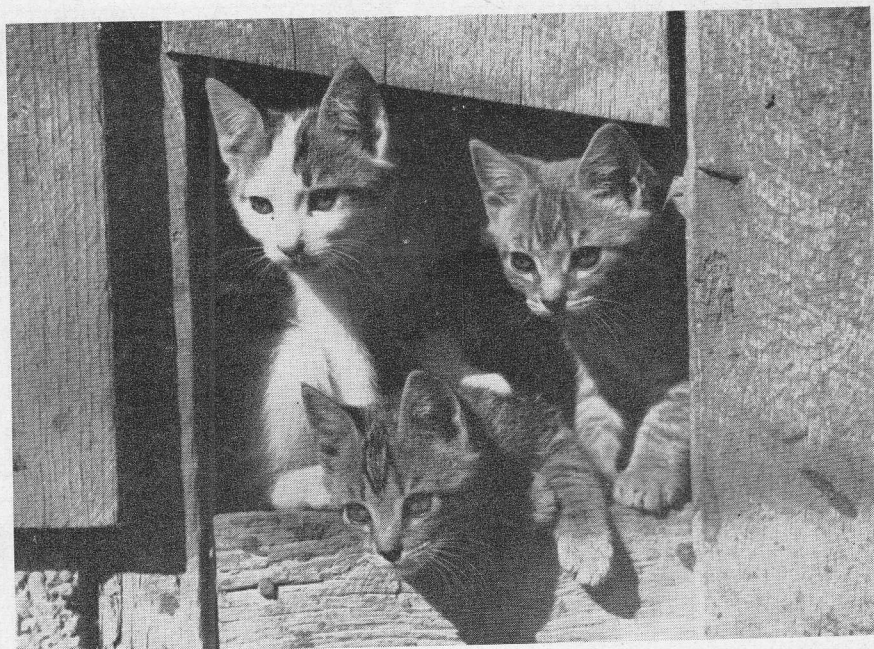

Cats Question Box

Conducted by E. A. Renaux, D. V. M.

My seven year old Calico has always gone around with the tip or more of her tongue hanging out, but lately has been doing it more and more and has begun to drip saliva as well. She drinks more water than all the other cats, lately has developed a rasp or rumble in her chest or throat and now also seems to have a case of mange. I'm particularly worried because her brother has started to show the same symptoms.

I would expect that there might be some physical abnormality present such as an elongation of the soft palate or a constriction of the pharynx. With a brother and sister having the same sort of trouble, it may well go back to the mating of that litter. The drooling is evidence that the cats are not swallowing the saliva being produced. There would be no connection between this condition and the mange.

Our female cat has developed a habit of pulling the hair from her back and tail until it now resembles an opossum's. Can you advise a remedy to relieve the apparent itching which seems to be the cause of the hair pulling?

There are many preparations that should be of value in relieving an external itch and most of them contain benzocaine. I would suggest frequent combing and brushing to remove all dead and loose hair and the application of either Americaine ointment (Arnar-Stone) or Panthoderm Cream (U.S. Vitamin).

My purebred Longhair female, eighteen months old, has swollen glands under her front and back legs where they join the body. There is also an eczema-like condition of the skin, dry "bumps" on the back, around base of tail, etc. She has never had any kittens, and for the past several months has shown no inclination that way.

There may be some over-activity of these glands due to a systemic cause. The skin condition might be attributable to the same difficulty. I would suggest that since other treatments have shown no results your present course would be to have a blood count taken to determine if there is something wrong there.

Recently we were given a long-haired red female kitten about four months old. We soon discovered that she was not in the best of condition. She was listless, had a poor appetite, loose bowels, and a badly developed set of deciduous teeth. Her coat and whiskers also showed evidence of poor nutrition. Our first thought was leukopenia, which is unfortunately very common in this area. Our vet, however, discovered that she was suffering not only from malnutrition, but also from what he described as a bacterial bowel infection. He also removed two cattle ticks from her ear! After a course of terramycin, her appetite and bowel condition returned to normal. With the aid of a good diet and vitamin pills, her general health has apparently become excellent.

The one thing that still concerns me is that she has a persistent discharge from both eyes, with no evidence of visual difficulty and no apparent itching or irritation. This discharge dries in the corners of the eyes and has to be removed about once a day. We feel sure that her diet (fresh horse meat, milk, fowl gizzards and livers, occasional pork liver) is perfectly adequate, yet this discharge has persisted for weeks after the other symptoms disappeared. Our other cats, two short-haired adults, take the same diet and have not developed this trouble. The possibility has occurred to me that the unusual amount of sand and dust present in this area may in some way account for it, but I think this is hardly likely. The cat definitely does not have ascarids or tapeworm; this was established by the vet.

I would appreciate your opinion and advice in this matter.

From your complete and excellent report you leave me very little to suggest. My only thought at this time would be that there could be a sensitiveness or allergy causing this condition. The use of vitamin A and Riboflavin might help to overcome any weakness that would not be apparent.

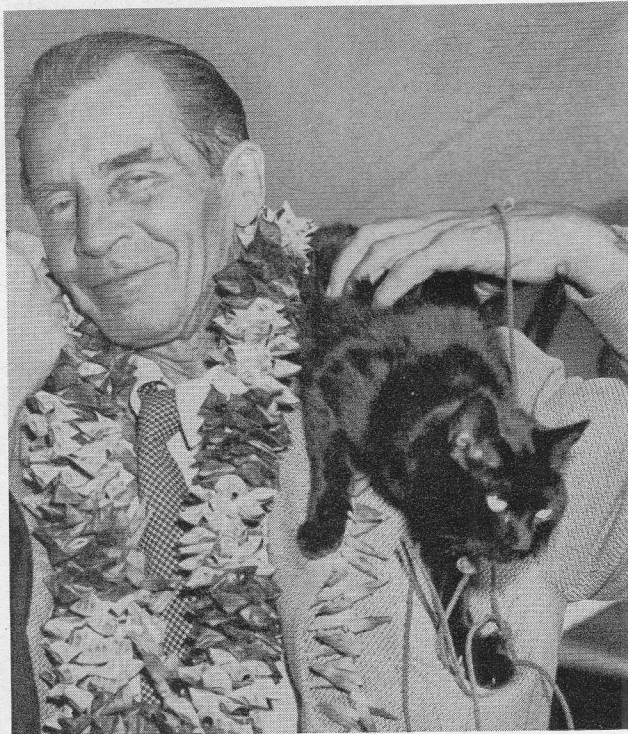

... Miss Shull phoned me to write and tell you she heard L. Thomas broadcast the 23rd. Stated G. Charny had offered \$1000 to help her succeed in her cat bill.

Mrs. Long also enclosed this clipping from Los Angeles Times, dated Manhattan Beach, Calif., Nov. 21. In part:

On the heels of the newest phase in the perennial feline dilemma, the City Council has agreed to ask the League of California Cities to search for ordinances that might regulate the cat population in a manner similar to existing control of dogs

Maybe the Charny news explains the bulletin (mimeograph) she sent to her members all over the nation, dated Nov. 3, 1954: "... Now I have an extraordinary project. I dare not say in advance what it is for fear of a leak. There is no gamble, for their are certain to be results worth far more than the investment. If the project is completely successful, it will be a wonderful thing, that will make all of us proud and happy the rest of our lives. I need \$1000. It would be easy if you have faith in me. Will you help?

Evidently Charny during November has raised the \$1000 for her award — announced by Lowell Thomas.

Now! not a darned bit of good blaming Charny. It means that Cat Lovers have to wake up. To date, in California and helping a bit nationally, Alice M. Clark of San Francisco and I have had to bear the brunt of the fight, with the fine cooperation of a *very small* group of loyal cat lovers. In the ten years I've been fighting anti-cat legislation (guess it's about 8 years, really)—from all the

nation of cat lovers, less than a total of \$200 has been donated! We've worked on a shoestring and almost all of the cost of that has been donated by Alice and myself.

You know and so do I that marauding cat and most other problems of overpopulation and its attendant ills for both dogs and cats lies in animal birth control. But before that goal, we have to face the dreary, costly and inconclusive fights like Charny's.

SO: that leaves us with a 1955 Legislative problem. To center, from past events, in California and most likely Illinois; with possibilities of Connecticut and Indiana.

We have neither time or money to reach regularly (in our case not at all) the several thousand national outlets reached regularly by Charny.

Evidently there are enough fanatics to send her lots of money annually—and it looks as if in a few weeks she has received \$1000 from the nation for her award money.

Well, that's that. I sent an appeal in *Cats Magazine* for data on licensing, to help on the 1955 fight. In three months I had one reply—from Michigan!

This fight will best center in the present as in the past in an incorporated group, equipped for state and national affairs, FEDERATED GROUP, INC. of 1538 Irving Street, San Francisco 22 —Mrs. Alice M. Clark, Secy.-Treas.—that address will be changed in January so temporarily communications may be sent to me at Beaumont, Calif.—I can forward anything to Alice at any time. And financial help sent to Alice for Federated Group, Inc. will help.

If we can raise a title for CATS of what Charny raises to fight them, F. G., Inc. can handle the situation.

If only cat lovers could fight like the alley cats for survival!!!!

Anyway: in 1955 we face the supreme effort of Gertrude Charny and the forces of reaction with a handful of fanatics against a wide-spread but inert group of cat lovers. Naturally, that means a handful of us to carry the load. Can we spread the area of influence among cat lovers who will work for ALL CATS among their own pets? Alice and I are no longer young—kid ourselves as we may—neither of us are financially able to carry the burden necessary to match \$1000 special awards and maintain regular releases reaching into the thousands.

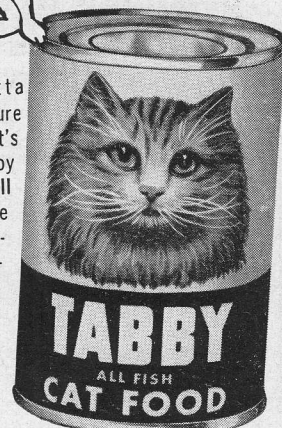
We discount at the beginning any wide interest on the part of cat lovers. But surely there are enough to back us with a wee bit of finance and work. What happens to cat legislation is up to cat lovers—can we reach a few of them? It's up to us—NOW!!!

Cat lovers, being humans, are inert for the most part—but a minority WILL help if they can be made to realize the situation. Can we do it? WILL we do it? The Cats' Attorney rests the case for the moment.

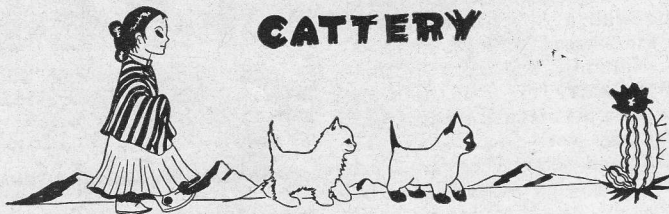

MY EXPERIENCE WITH HEPATITIS

by Mrs. Joseph Marshall

According to Webster, Hepatitis is:— inflammation of the liver.

It is a serious illness and requires much care, cleanliness being very important as the patient is constantly in a state of being soiled. The patient runs a high temperature, loses weight rapidly, and the body becomes gaunt and drawn very quickly after disease is contracted. Hepatitis is sometimes fatal, in my case it was not, due, I believe, to the medical care my cat received.

When my Clem had her first litter of babies she was a strong, healthy mother. Her kittens were all fat and healthy and thrived from the start, however, when the babies were about ten days old, Clem started to lose weight, she looked drawn and grew thin rapidly, and her eyes held a lost, haggard expression. She passed a heavy, thick discharge of blood from her bowels constantly. She never stopped eating and the kittens continued to thrive and showed no signs of their mother's illness. When the kittens were two weeks old I took them from the mother and raised them on a doll bottle.

I talked to our Vet about Clem and he advised shots of Penicillin & Streptomycin combined. I gave her about 1 cc of this mixture every twenty four hours, along with a 50 mg. capsule of Auero-mycin twice daily. By the end of the second day Clem had improved, and by the fourth day the discharge had stopped. All during her illness, Clem continued to eat, and soon started to recover. In about two weeks she was almost her old self, gaining back her weight, and showed no signs of her illness except for bare spots on her hips and her hind quarters, caused, possibly, by the high temperature, and where the discharge had soiled.

I am still a novice—but even a novice can learn from experience, and I feel that perhaps someone else may profit from my experience. It is my first encounter with Hepatitis—and, I hope, my last; however, if I do encounter it again in my Cattery I shall know exactly what to do.

WINIFRED PORTER

"I love Cat Shows," said Winnie Porter to me, while attending the Boston Show. "If I win, fine, if I lose, fine, I still love Cat Shows."

The Show ended on Saturday and Winnie stayed over the week-end to visit some of her friends here. The George Greens and I took her out to Sharon on Sunday to see Ralph Mabie, as he was unable to come in to the Show.

On Monday she left Boston for New York, alone, driving her station wagon. I should not say alone, for she had six cats with her and to Winnie this was ample companionship.

In the afternoon, perhaps because she was blinded by the setting sun, or dozing at the wheel, her car left the road on a curve in Orange, Connecticut, turned over, and she was killed. All the cats survived. They were taken to a nearby veterinarian's and later shipped to New Orleans.

"Mr. Tommy" who had driven her from New Orleans to New York was located and took her to Arkansas for burial.

After a friendship of twenty years she will be sadly missed by this writer. She was always so very kind and generous to me and to all her friends. Such a vital, alive person, always with a funny story or experience to tell. Her warm Southern voice and accent and expressive face gave her stories an added interest.

I don't believe that she ever turned away a cat that needed a home, and I



know that she still kept on working (she was a nurse) even after she had been retired from the Clinic where she had been many years, so that she could afford to feed the many cats she gave a home to.

will enable you to judge its type. However, it is good to remember that the "perfect" cat does not exist but there are many which come very close to that which might be called perfect. In breeding, always strive to improve your stock. Study your queen and notice her fine points as well as her faults. Pick a stud cat of a type that will further enhance the good points of your queen or one that is strong in those qualities in which the queen is lacking. Also it is advisable to remain within a particular range of color.

Color Breeding

Color breeding is very desirable in establishing a particular line of cats.

Next month we will discuss the basic fundamentals in color breeding as the second part of this matter of "Choosing a Stud Cat for Your Queen". After you have decided on a mate and your queen has been bred, our July article *On Being a Midwife to Your Cat* should help you when the kittens arrive.

badly mangled. However its wounds were clean, not ravaged by flies, and although its bones stood out markedly in its dark grey fur and its eyes were sunken in its white-spotted head, it still must have nourishment of some kind during its 53 day ordeal. At last word, the cat was taking food, and showed signs that it would recover. Its spirit was good, it is still friendly and will make up with people.

This last item filled the New York papers for two days. A small black cat, Penny, sat on a bench in Upper Manhattan Court with Magistrate Neal P. Bottiglieri. She was the principal figure in a complaint against Frank Leahey, twenty-six, a travel consultant, of 31 Park Terrace West. He was accused of causing Penny unjustifiable physical pain and suffering.

The complaint was filed by James De Nina, an advertising man who occupies the next apartment, and Mrs. Mildred Hampe, who lives directly above the defendant. Mr. De Nina said he had been awakened at 2:30 A.M. three weeks previously by howls of a cat in the next apartment. The howling continued for two hours, and Mr. Leahey refused to let him in the apartment or tell him what was happening to the cat. At 8:30 A.M., he and Mrs. Hampe went into the apartment and found Penny behind a sofa, bleeding from the nose and mouth and soaking wet. Both testified that Mr. Leahey had told them he had lost his temper and had beaten and kicked Penny and tried to drown her in the bathtub. Mr. Leahey denied the charges in court, saying "I never mistreat animals," however, a veterinarian brought into court said that when Penny had been brought to him, three weeks ago, she was indeed a sorry sight, bleeding, wet, suffering from internal injuries and in a state of shock. Penny, in near normal health at the time of the hearing except that her fur was one-third gone, was turned over to Mrs. Marian Parks Grey, president of the League Against Vivisection. The cruelty charge was withdrawn, on condition that Mr. Leahey agree never again to own a domestic animal as a pet. He agreed and also paid the veterinarian's bill, which after treatment and three weeks' care, came to \$130.

We surely hope Mrs. Frances Peloso, 473 McBride Ave., Paterson, N. J., realizes her error of ignoring the diamonds in her own backyard. She found a stray cat in her hallway one dawn and picked it up, preparing to put it out, saying aloud, "I told you I didn't want you here." Just then, she told police, a man, obviously a prowler, stepped out of the shadows and took off in a hurry.

A cat-lover in the central police station at Baltimore, Md., has definite ideas how fellow-employees should treat a stray, dirty white kitten that was given a place to sleep one night. A hand-lettered sign over a shelf where the kitten sleeps says: "Anyone who don't like this cat, ask for a transfer. The cat likes it here—if you don't like it, you leave."

before Garden State has met this competition and it did not affect the gate.

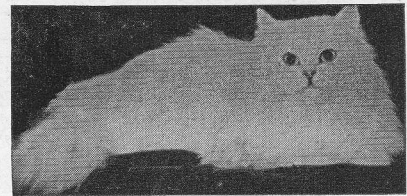

The Back Fence . . .

National Cat Week came and went this year, bringing with it, along with the usual Charny blarney some splendid essay-editorials in favor of cats. All the way from Montclair, N. J., to N. Y., N. Y.; Canton, Ohio to Madison, Wisc.; Sioux City, Iowa, to Sacramento, Calif., they came, and this time they were all written by gentlemen (aux armes, ladies, where were you?) who told in various ways of their amoures with feline hearts.

One of the best pieces, we thought, was written by Whitney Bolton, Newark, N. J. News, who informs us: "Among other frightening statistics concerning the city of New York is that it has 18,173 Siamese cats loose in it and this is a good deal like having 18,173 small, coldly intelligent, stainless steel-taloned dragons wandering around. The word loose is used loosely. Actually, they all have homes. But anyone who has ever been within nine feet of a Siamese cat knows that doors, walls, and windows are playthings for them. They seem to vanish right through them. The proper furniture period for any house or apartment in which a Siamese has consented to dwell is Early Penitentiary." With accurate insight into the way the wheels turn under those tiny but active brown skulls, Mr. Bolton continues by telling of the actress's cat who sounds the alarm for dinner, should it be a minute late by jumping on the mantelpiece; two minutes late, the cat cooly puts one paw against a jug; three minutes, he pushes the jug to the edge of the mantel and gives her a mocking look. He says Olivia de Havilland once possessed two Siamese cats, litter brothers. "In less than a year, she yelled for help. Would you like to know what man was fool enough to offer to take the cats off her hands? This one. The man writing this piece about Siamese cats." In conclusion, the columnist asks himself: "Why does anyone have one of these creatures around? They are the smartest things alive. They have intelligence so advanced it is awesome. Also, they are better watchdogs than any dog ever bred." In a later piece in which Whitney Bolton goes to visit his friend Danny Houlihan in his Second Ave. snug, he muses further upon the peculiar tricks, qualities and variations in feline behavior which make up those little devils we who own them call Siamese.

Perhaps the top artistic event of the feline world took place also in New York. The operatic version of Don Marquis' archy and mehitabel was performed at Town Hall on Dec. 6th by the Little Orchestra Society.

Howard Taubman, music critic for the New York Times, discussing the operatic version of Don Marquis' tales of the cockroach, archy, and his amorally wayward friend, mehitabel, says: "The creation of George Kleinsinger, who wrote the music, and Joe Darion, who prepared the libretto after studying his Don Marquis, is spirited, often raucous and, like mehitabel herself, 'toujours gai'." The score consists of dances, blues, duets, quartets, a lullaby-using the idiom of the music hall, the honky tonk and Tin Pan Alley. Louis Biancolli, critic for the World-Telegram, said: "Richard Sharett strutted and leered as the Tom cat, bill, and Mignon Dunn, a snugly-velevted siren, rolled her eyes and everything else as mehitabel. As archy, Jonathan Anderson not only sang, gestured and emoted; he arched his back and hopped up and down an array of wooden stools. The 'Four Heathertones' made an amusing chorus in their lively back-alley sorties, and Mr. Kleinsinger himself performed, with obvious relish, as Narrator."

Meanwhile, Scoopy II, cat reporter for the Greenwich Village paper, the Villager, wrote an excellent book review of *Love Story Writer*, by Daisy Bacon, publishers Hermitage House. Miss Bacon was editor of Love Story Magazine for twenty years, "long enough to make anyone an authority on the subject," and has among other hints, written some excellent words of advice, seemingly obvious enough but even in our limited experience not heeded: "Read the magazines you are writing for." Scoopy reports from time to time local happenings from a small but talent-laden section of New York City, Greenwich Village.

An interesting series of pictures in the antiques section of the New York World-Telegram displays a handsome cat, done in Oriental style, among other examples of chalk-ware, an early American art that interested George Washington, who ordered several pieces for Mount Vernon. Actually, chalk-ware was not of chalk but of plaster from Paris, usually poured in two half-molds, glued together when dry and hand-painted. The art has been traced first to Italy, then to Germany, Moravia and the Palatinate, whence it came, via German immigrants, to this country. Chalk-ware was a "poor man's art," originally selling as low as 15 cents, with the more

elaborate pieces averaging 50 cents, and is still moderately priced by our standards, however, many pieces, especially figures of brightly colored fruits or animals, retain a charm to this day.

Pittsburgh is not, and never has been, we're sorry to say, much of a cat town, but we did manage to contribute a tiny bit to this artistic news of cats. The Carnegie Institute exhibit included two genre paintings with felines, one by Francois Boucher with kitten snoozing beside his mistress who is bathing her feet, the other, a painting of Van Hemesen, shows puss is begging some food identified as roasted larks.

About the only word from the usually voluble West Coast this month is the unique method author Howard Estabrook has devised for rounding up four felines at dinner time without yelling or clanging bells. He opens a can of their favorite food, puts it under the exhaust fan back of the kitchen stove, the aroma is wafted over the neighborhood, and—yes, it works.

We were mighty pleased to hear of one pair of landlords who rent only to choice people, those who like cats, the pair being Marge and Gower Champion, who allowed Lisa Kirk to rent their house on one condition, that she care for the eight cats residing therein. According to reliable sources, the Champions, on tour, call every other day to hear the gang meow "hello."

The Rural New Yorker cites a case which will be doubly interesting now that cat restriction is being urged again so vehemently by Miss Charny's bird faction. A tiger cat named Casey was sued through his owners, Mr. and Mrs. L. Baxter, Vancouver, B. C., for trespass and damages. The prosecutors claimed repayment for loss caused by Casey's having eaten one \$15 canary, one \$7.00 goldfish, and for having spoiled \$18 worth of bulbs. In spite of evidence against Casey, the cat's lawyer, Charles S. Hopkins, won a unique defense based on a 15th century English law from a famous English Court of Appeals decision, in which the learned judge ruled as follows: "There can be no suit against cats that pass by night because the animals are merely following their natural propensities." Accordingly, Judge Boyd of County Court dismissed the case, and also set a precedent on the legality of cat control in Canada for future reference. Of course, we're sorry the canary was eaten, the bulbs and the goldfish disappeared too, whether Casey did the deeds or not (and his photo looks like he just might have), but we can't help feeling delight for once, that cats came off best, and in a legal suit at that. Cats have been down-trodden so long and have had such a struggle to survive, through the ages, our sympathies will remain always with them. We doubt, some of mankind being the way they are, the time will ever come when cats won't need sympathy, all of it they can get.

These words prompted partially by recent items coming to our attention. A man in Louisville, Ky., accused of burning the tail completely off the half-grown "Maltese" cat of John Bryant, 804 S. Preston, was fined \$10 and placed under \$1000 peace bond for a year. Bryant testified witnesses had told him the defendant had tied papers to the cat's tail, set fire to the papers. The tail withered and dropped off. In Hackensack, N. J., Robert L. Tour of 11 Henry Street, summoned Patrolman Richard O'Grady to the scene when he saw a cat floundering in a sewer. O'Grady scooped the cat out with a fish net. It was learned later two small boys, one 11, one 7, had thrown the cat in the sewer.

Children we forgive—not forget, entirely, but surely forgive, and look to their parents. Grown, supposedly adult people—well, are they people? Take the case of a 42-year old man in Westfield, Mass., accused of using his back yard for a rifle range. During one session, he shot a neighboring kitten and was thereby removed from the firing line by Judge Arthur T. Garvey for six months. Already the possessor of a long police record, the man was sentenced on a charge of cruelty to animals and drunkenness, pleading guilty to both complaints, although he claimed the kitten was shot accidentally when he was cleaning his rifle. Judge Garvey maintained, however, there could have been more serious consequences due to the heavily populated area, and said the matter could not be dismissed lightly.

Two more horror items, which we report only so that you cat lovers will know such things *do* go on, and that it is you who must see they never happen to *your* pets, and beyond that, if you *can* try to help those poor unfortunates who have no help otherwise. A cat sought since early last July near Scranton, Pa., cruelly bound in conner wire and left to die was found late in September, still alive but suffering badly. The wires, used in electrical work, had cut into the rear quarters and abdomen of the cat, its right front leg was out of joint and

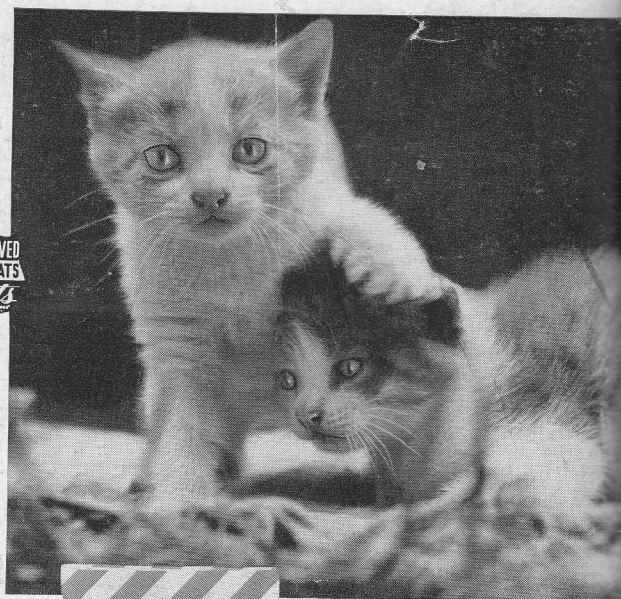
