shows at home and abroad. It is a special thrill when a cable arrives to announce some top award for an adult or kitten who has not long left our shores for a new and strange home overseas.

It is becoming increasingly necessary for all to learn to judge their kittens very early, to appraise the good and not so good in what they breed. They must seek the breeding that fits in with the pedigrees of their queens, not just the most fashionable of studs. This applies to Longhairs and Shorthairs alike.

Our newer breeds—Burmese and Colourpoints—are making a great name for themselves around the world and to the pioneers of these varieties we send greetings and good wishes for the coming year. Many of these cats are being sought after, but the breeders are wise and will not deplete the country of all our best stock during these early stages of development. Mr. V. Watson guards the Burmese and Mr. Brian Stirling-Webb the Colourpoints. The last-named has achieved wonderful results with the variety and history was made when one of his young Colourpoints was Best Kitten in Show on two occasions. He narrowly missed a third title, but this will undoubtedly come as adults and kittens show a great improvement over the past year.

A Chestnut that is new

The latest arrival in the cat world is the Chestnut Brown Foreign, which was called "Havana" by some breeders, a name which was never accepted by the Fancy. History has also been made with this breed as a representative recently won a first Challenge Certificate.

Many British-bred cats won Challenge Certificates and International Challenge Certificates at the recent Cat Club de Paris Show. Three English judges went over to join two others and there they found amongst others Shan of Allington, Rosita of Dunesk, Ch. Merlin of Brentside, Daydream of Thame and Int. Ch. Doneraile Leo, a well-known winner on the Continent, all worthy of special recognition. Our cats and kittens have also been winning at the recent Brussels Show, at many of the Australian, New Zealand and American shows, also in Norway, Denmark and Sweden. Greetings go to them all as their welfare is dear to the hearts of their breeders.

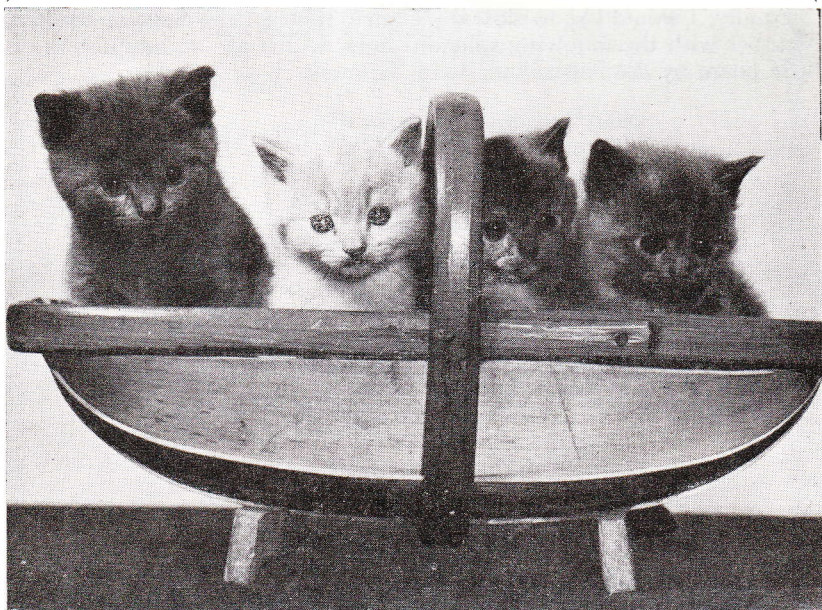

Christening cats

WHAT'S in a name? "A rose by any other name will smell as sweet" says the poet. It certainly doesn't when it is a case of choosing a name for either the new pedigree kitten or for the stray who has decided to adopt you.

More than any other animal the cat is an individual, and as such he, or she, must have just the right name. One friend of mine has had six Siamese, and they have all been called Susie. Her explanation for this lack of originality is that she does not get into a muddle by addressing her cat by the wrong name—a point of view I cannot understand.

I called my beautiful red tabby Cromwell because he came into my life after I had lost Oliver. Cromwell must always come after Oliver. I could, of course, have called him Roland—"a Roland for an Oliver." But when I counted up his feeding dishes, pan for cooking fish, casserole for his rabbit, blankets, basket, brushes, playthings, I wondered why I had not christened him Soames, for he was certainly a "*Man of Property*" (John Galsworthy).

Fluffy, Sooty, Nigger, Tinker—not very original for that bundle of black mischief. He is bound to become a proud Lucifer or a Pluto, or a sleek-coated, inscrutable Sybilla.

And why are so many lively Reds, both short-haired and long-haired, answering to just Ginger or Sandy? Why not Hector Macnab, Robert, Rufus, Macgregor, Macwhirter, Lady Macbeth? Or, simply Boy and Girl—boy friend and the girl friend. I nearly called one pussy Agag. Why? Well, although these cats step firmly into your heart they always step so lightly and gently over

your threshold. "Then, said Samuel, 'Bring ye hither to me Agag, the king of the Amalekites' . . . and Agag came unto him *gently*." (*1 Samuel XV*).

The Bible is a great source of inspiration for names—David and Jonathan, Naomi and Ruth, Samson and Delilah, Peter and Paul, are good for pairs. Then what about Jephthah—"A mighty man of valour" (*Judges, XI*)?

For noisy ones

If you are one of those owners who spoil your pet and go to the larder more often than you should for some tasty fish or a saucer of the top off the milk, then anticipate that inevitable early middle-aged spread and call him Peckham after the fat boy of Charles Dickens.

For the stray, who looks at you so beseechingly, I suggest Dorothea, which means "gift of God." And if you are going to have your female kitten spayed, then how about Virginia? Both these names will shorten easily for calling them in at night—Dorrie and Ginnie.

Most cats have loud voices. The Siamese certainly intend that everyone shall hear them, so let the world of music help in this christening task. Banjo—Piccolo—Trombone or Zildjian, the Turkish word for cymbal-maker. Or, for fun, why not be really original and call your Seal-point Dumb Crambo?

Schottische—Polka—Tango, etc. Some Persians have been called Scheherazade, a role danced by the famous Karsavina; but I have never heard of a Dinazarde, who was Scheherazade's sister.

Burmese, Siamese and hybrid
kittens for sale, all house-reared

Many breeds call for oriental names—Siamese, Abyssinians, Burmese, Persians, Russian Blues. It is not so easy to get true names for the wonderful breed which came originally from Siam, or Thailand. The language has forty-four consonants, thirty vowels, and to add to the difficulty it is a tonic language. The same word pitched, high, low or spoken in a medium tone has as many meanings.

But here are some suggestions :—

King Mongkut—a great and wise ruler referred to in the film “Anna and the King of Siam.”

Wat Arun—the Temple of Dawn at Bangkok.

Asoka—a Buddhist King.

Prince Chula Chakrabongse—he represented His Majesty, the King of Thailand at Queen Elizabeth’s Coronation in 1953.

Sukhothai—happy people.

Wat Phra Keo—Temple of the Emerald Buddha.

Chesda or Nangklae—the king who sits over our heads, a title still applied by members of the Royal Family.

King Bhumiphol Adundij—which is pronounced Poomipon.

Korat—the traditional home of the Siamese cat. Travellers report that the natives say : “No cats—all gone England.”

Ankana—a Siamese Christian name.

Kao Luang—highest mountain of Southern Siam.

Phaya Takkt Sin—a great Siamese General.

Swami—a Chinese word meaning master or lord.

Namaskar—an Indian word, which means “I greet the Divine in you.”

And why not Lord of Chao-Phraya (a river) and Prince of Bankok ? Mis-

chievous imps that the Siamese cats always are, they can still hold themselves as true lords and princes.

One eleven-year-old Siamese I have the honour to know rejoices in the name of U-Pu-Kythyn (pronounced Pookin). The U-Pu is Burmese for Mr. He is indeed, a “mister,” adores white wine, and will catch anything from a mouse to a moose.

Other suggestions are :—Zenobia, Fatima, Musetta, Typhoo, Louella, Zuki, Pearl, Diamond, Ruby, Sapphire, Sheba, Jo-Jo, Nefrititi. The last three are the names of Siamese, who own Michael Butterworth, the Editor of “Valentine.” He also has one called simply Percy. Mr. Butterworth told me he was the size of a little white sausage when he was born. But he was the first of the litter to purr—Purr-see !

I am sure some owners will want to call their Siamese or Burmese after the ten daughters of Mr. Ngo Dinh Luyen, Vietnam’s Ambassador in London. The names are :—Mai-Loo (Cherry Flowerbuds), Dieu-Cam (Harmonious Music), Dien-Van (Graceful Cloud), Ngoc-Anh (Pure Diamond), Chou-Lan (Black Orchid), Anh-Mai (Cherry Blossom), Mai-Chi (Branch of the Cherry), Van-Yen (Swallow of the Clouds), Kim-Lan (Limid Aurora), Minh-Chieu (Golden Orchid).

Yes—it is a fascinating problem trying to find just the right answer to “what shall we call him—or her ?” I have quite made up my mind that my next friend shall be called Bluebell. Why ? Because as I write this article I hear a song coming sweetly over the radio about “Bluebell—flower of my heart.” Any cat of mine will always be just that.

Cats in Paint & Print

By SIDNEY DENHAM

Sidney Denham is the author of "Cats Between Covers" and with Helen Denham collected the exhibits for the "Cats Through The Ages" Exhibition of pictures, ceramics, books, etc., in London in 1953. Under the title "Cats in Paint and Print" he will write periodically about cats in books and the arts and will welcome interesting items from readers or answer their questions.

THE French cartoonist Siné has produced a highly original book of cat drawings based on the discovery that catachresis provides a basis for a whole new field of humour. Siné drove me to the dictionary in search of words containing the syllable cat and the discovery that catachresis means the perverted use of words. His book *Scatty* (Max Reinhardt 6s.) is a series of drawings of cats illustrating words containing the combination cat or chat. Skill as a cartoonist and scattiness combine to produce page after page which will raise a smile even during post-influenzal depression.

It is only right to tell aileurophiles (after a dose of Siné, I avoid cat-lovers guessing how he would illustrate them) that the fun is verbal and not feline, a sort of visual punning and not based on the characteristics or even characteristics (Siné is catching) of cats. Yet at the same time many of Siné's cats are real cats we all recognize.

The publishers offer prizes to readers for the most original ideas for new "scatty" pictures. The *Daily Mail* has already run a competition of the same kind and they were overwhelmed with entries, the best of which was "Chatter-box," illustrated by a public telephone booth occupied in a way with which we are only too familiar.

Scattiness is obviously going to become the vogue in some circles. Intellectual cat-lovers will this Christmas be playing a variation of the old game "I love my love with an A . . . , etc." substituting cat for love. You could start with loving your cat with an A because he's in Alcatraz, B because he's a baccate cat, C because he's catastrophic and work through to Xencaton, Yucatan and Zecatric. Two of the words are not in the dictionary but are permissible because there are no cat words beginning with X and Z and this is a scatty game anyway.

Curious corruptions

An hour spent with reference books as a result of Siné prompts some interesting reflections. "Cat words" and expressions fall roughly into three classes. Some are genuinely based on our name for our four-footed furry friends. Others are due to corruptions and mistranslations. And the great majority, of course, have nothing to do with cats at all. The many beginning with cata-, cat- and cath- which provide the basis of numerous Siné puns are from the Greek and have no reference to the cat, although admittedly cats are sometimes down, away, entire, alongside and throughly, which are the prefixes meanings.

Many of the corruptions and mistranslations are curious. Catgut is probably corrupted from gut-cord and cat's cradle from cratch cradle (creche),

An amusing example of mistranslation is Cat-Water at Plymouth. Originally it was a chateau. Some helpful or xenophobic person preferred it in English and translated it literally—chat, cat ; eau, water. This is worthy of Siné.

The English word cat has been used for other things. The Dick Whittington story is said to be based on the fact that a certain type of ship used for coal carrying was known as a cat. It is thought possibly by a not uncommon inversion a tac (or tackle) on a ship became a cat, and hence the various ropes known as cats which gave rise to the cat-o'-ninc-tails and in turn lack of room to swing a cat. A cat was also a special type of six-legged tripod and a pent house used in assaults on castles.

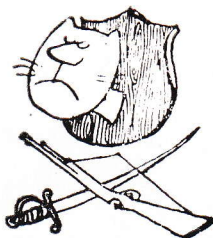
The soldier's kit has more to do with the old cooking utensils (kitchen) than the young of cats. Pewter pots were known as cats and kittens and hence the inn sign "The Cat and Kittens." The "Cat and Fiddle" has been variously ascribed to corruptions of Catherine la fidele, wife of Peter the Great and Caton le fidele, a governor of Calais.

Like Siné, one could go on like this for ever—but my cat-kins are calling me for their supper.

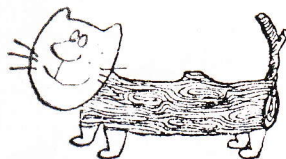

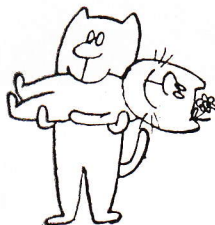

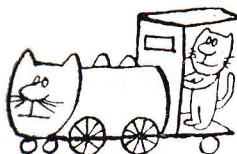

NEW BOOKS FOR YOUR SHELVES

"Cassandra's Cats," by William Connor (Hutchinson, 12s. 6d.). The author admits to having written "the preposterous total of over a million words" as a columnist for the *Daily Mirror*. He also confesses to cat worshipping among his hobbies. How deep this feeling goes may be gleaned from a brief extract from Cassandra's introduction: "I love cats. I like 'em big and small and black and white. . . I like them when they are young and gay and when they are old and battered. I prefer short-haired cats to long-haired cats—but I still like long-haired cats. Cats are the most mysterious animals in Creation." This book presents twelve delightful cameos of cats he has known and their companions. The accompanying illustrations are excellently reproduced in gravure.

"Our Cats Picture Book," edited by Arthur E. Cowlshaw, text by Sidney Denham, foreword by Christabel Lady Aberconway. (Nicholas Kaye, 18s.). Please see elsewhere in this issue for fuller details. It's the perfect gift for Christmas and the New Year.

"The Cat in my Mind," by John Inglis Hall (Putnam & Company, 15s.). The author's acquaintance with cats began when he was a boy living in the Lake District where his mother was carrying out breeding experiments with colour breeding of orange and cream Persians. There were sometimes up to

twenty cats in the family's various homes during his early years. Now he sees cats as aloof, self-contained and elegant. This offering is a book of poems illustrated by Lilian MacKendrick, the distinguished American artist who has painted many of America's best known cats.

"Three Men and a Girl," by Warren Chetham - Strode (Heinemann, 15s.). Well-known as a playwright on serious themes, the author digresses somewhat violently to present a charming fantasy based on the idea that animals who utter sounds are really speaking in their own language. If only human beings will take a little trouble, they can learn to understand it. The principal characters are Charles and Mary Warren and the story, which will be enjoyed by all ages, describes their relationship with four Siamese cats. Sheila Hawkins illustrates a number of situations and she has given us Siamese that really look like G.C. registrations. And that's a nice change!

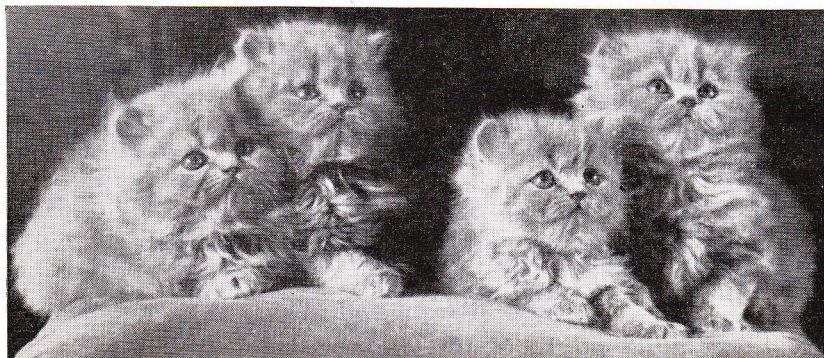

balls of wool, part-knitted garments, etc.—he pounces on and carries off home.

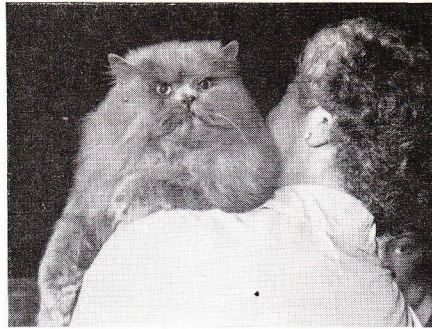

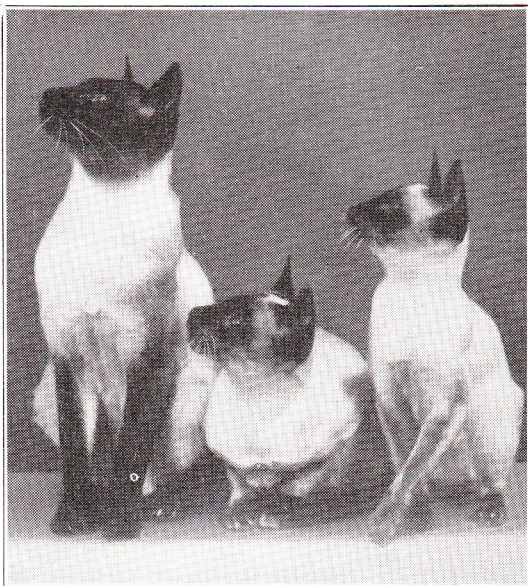

Reproduction (No. 51)

By A. C. JUDE

This popular series of monographs has brought added interest to breeding operations throughout the cat world and has helped fanciers by supplying information concerning both inherited and all other factors. Each article has a direct bearing on the genetic basis for the likenesses and differences between cats.

TO readers everywhere, my wishes are that your Christmas may be a truly happy one, and that throughout the New Year your efforts will be rewarded with great success.

At the same time, I wish to thank you for the kindly and helpful letters which so many have sent me during the past twelve months. Additional friendships have resulted, and this in itself has made my writings in OUR CATS well worth while.

Once again, I ask for your continued help by bringing to my notice any breeding results which may seem unusual, and if I can help with advice on breeding problems, believe me, I shall be only too happy.

During the last year or so, one or two mutations in cats have been brought to notice, and some fresh variations, particularly in "colour", have been established by the crossing of the already established ones. It was written, not so very long ago, that no attempts have been made by geneticists to establish new varieties. But surely this is a matter mainly for the fancier.

The geneticist's part is to show the way by making known the mechanisms and the known whys and wherefores of the various factors involved. That is exactly what we try to do in these articles. And with this kind of knowledge, the

fancier should be able to work out the direct methods which will produce any possible new variety or combination which he or she has in mind.

With a knowledge of the subject (usually, only text-book facts are necessary), any fancier, so inclined, is placed in a position from which to get added attraction and fascination from his breeding. But why any fancier should blame the scientist for not doing what is obviously the breeder's part, one fails to see. In any case, one can only say that, when asked for, help is always freely and readily given.

About miniatures

In my book *Cat Genetics*, references are made to "dwarfism." The references mainly concern causes which may prevent individual animals from attaining full normal size. Quite frequently, these individual animals are sterile or near sterile, and it might therefore be very difficult to establish a strain, and if one were established it might prove to be a rather useless proposition in a fancy. However, as we all know, strains of miniature animals, notably in dogs, have been evolved.

In a letter from a reader in Pennsylvania it is pointed out that there is a domesticated strain of cats in Paraguay, the individuals of which are miniatures. The adults weigh only about three pounds, which, of course, is considerably

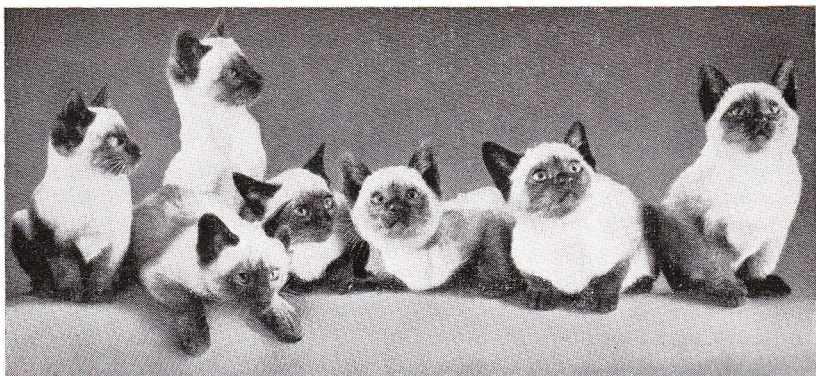

below normal cat weight. The body is noticeably elongated, and the hair, more especially on the tail, is short, close and shiny. There are suggestions that this type may have been derived from the jaguarondi, although there is no proof of this. However, it is pointed out that *Felis jaguarondi* can itself be domesticated; one of the keepers at a Chicago zoo is said to have had one as a house pet.

Perhaps the above may catch the eye of someone who is in a position to give more details of these miniature cats and their origin. Someone may even be in a position to do experimental breeding by crossing with normal breeds and so produce something else new in the Fancy world.

Cats that "scuttle"

Quite a number of interesting questions were put by my Pennsylvania correspondent. For instance, he asks if there is any connection between "ticked fur" and "voice" in cats. In the absence of sufficient data, no definite answer could be given. Maybe readers would like to help here, especially those who have had experience with several breeds. Until the fact is established no cause for connection could be suggested or even imagined.

Voice seems to rely, certainly in the main, on the physiological differences between breeds. We know for instance why even the smallest of birds are capable of producing such great volume to their voices, and also why some of the largest of our birds have little voice at all. However, any information concerning "ticking" of coat and "voice" in cats would be both useful and interesting.

Our friend ends his letter with a description of an abnormality in the local cat population. He mentions that he has frequently observed a local variation in his region (Lancaster County) which must be dominant; entire litters occur with cats whose legs are markedly shorter than normal:

the cats walk with a crouch, and scuttle rather than run. It does not seem to be a dietary deficiency: the bone structure is sound, and the cats seem perfectly healthy.

Importance of water

There are those who have the idea that water is something which animals only need either for quenching their thirst, or to make up for loss of moisture content. But, of course, there is more to it than just that. Water is not merely a "clear" liquid, but is a valuable container of trace elements which are vitally necessary for an animal's well-being. These trace elements, as the title implies, are only present in quite small quantities, but as mostly only small amounts are needed in the intake, the withholding of water may cause noticeable effects.

As mentioned in an earlier article, calcium is one of the essentials, and the ratio of calcium to phosphorous is important for reproduction and the normal functioning of the ovaries. Another essential is iodine. Without it, there cannot be proper functioning of the thyroid gland which controls growth. The iodine levels in water vary from place to place, and the ill-effects which only a small variation will produce may be quite significant.

But there are certain trace elements which are known to upset the assimilation and absorption of iodine, one of which is fluorine. This requires to be present in only very small amounts to produce its effect—at somewhere between 0.3 to 0.5 parts of fluorine per million parts of water, this element exercises a necessary and beneficial action. When water contains less than this amount, the incidence of dental decay is high.

Another of the trace elements found in water is molybdenum. The presence of this element in over quantity is found in places where there is much smoke from the smelting of aluminium, and

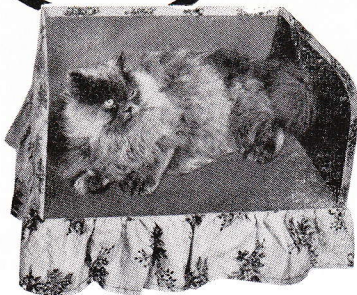

THE IDEAL GIFT TO CAT OWNERS

Veterinary Questions Answered

By M.R.C.V.S.

Could be mischief

A Berkshire reader writes : *One of the forelegs of my cat has swelled up considerably in the last two days. The swelling goes from the foot to nearly the elbow. In the middle of it there is an encircling wrinkle rather like those seen on the arms and legs of small fat babies. The cat is in pain. Can you please suggest a cure ?*

M.R.C.V.S. replies : Obviously this is not an abscess which, if present, would be much more localized. The wrinkle you mention prompts me to suggest that you probe down to the bottom of it in a good light. You will probably find that some mischievous child has put on an elastic band which of course has stopped the return of venous blood, and caused the pain and swelling. If you cannot find this band, seek veterinary advice.

The third eyelid

A Paris subscriber writes : *For several days my cat's eyes have been half covered by a sort of skin. Is this some disease of the eyes and what should be done about it ?*

M.R.C.V.S. replies : This so-called skin is in fact the third eyelid or "membrana nictitans," or haw. It is not a disease of the eye. The haw serves a useful function in removing foreign bodies from the cornea or glass of the eye; it also protects the eye when the cat is moving through bushes or undergrowth. But the protrusion is also seen when a cat is out of sorts. There is a pad of fat at the back of the eyeball, and if the cat retracts the eyeball into the orbit, this fat is

pushed forward and causes protrusion of the haw. Often a good purgative will clear the matter up.

Senile decay

A London reader writes : *What can I do to help my tabby tom cat, now nearly twelve years old ? He is losing flesh and becoming listless ; rarely wants to go out, and has developed a slight cough.*

M.R.C.V.S. replies : All these symptoms fit a diagnosis of senile decay. The majority of cats have a life of only ten years. Of course, there are many exceptions to that rule. The loss of condition and the listlessness are common to senility, and the cough is a frequent complication of a failing heart. One cannot successfully fight against old age, and I advise letting the cat live his life out, without dosing him with all sorts of quack medicines and vitamins.

They cannot do any good in such a case. It is presumed, however, that you have had a veterinary examination, to eliminate the possibility of some pathological condition being present.

Ear scratching

A young Surrey reader writes : *Our pussy has a tremendous swelling on one of its ears. He holds his head on one side and scratches the ear, making terrible wounds. What is the cause and the cure ?*

M.R.C.V.S. replies : The cause of this condition is infection of the ear canal with a mange mite, very common to cats. It sets up severe irritation,

inflammation, and an excess of wax secretion. It is the self-inflicted traumatism which causes the haematoma (or serous abscess) of the concha. The latter has to be opened by a surgeon and the blood-stained fluid released. The otodectic mange (cause of the trouble) is best cured and prevented by a preparation known as "Otodex," marketed by Strenol Products. 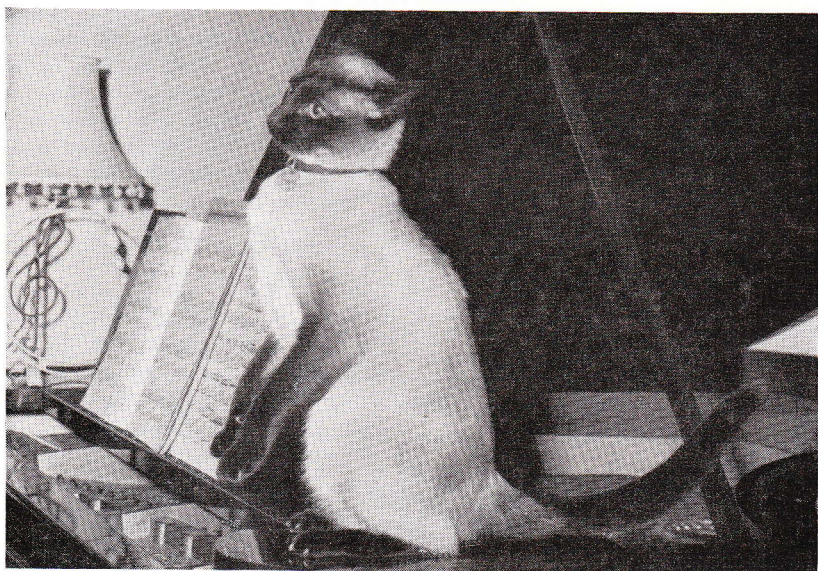

Gould to commemorate the Club's 10th Anniversary) for the most popular female cat chosen by public ballot and a similar trophy donated by Rev. H. Lovemore for the best male exhibit.

"What about some carol singing?" MING seems to be asking as he sits up and begs from the top of the piano. Bred by Miss D. M. Grainger, of Blackheath, S.E. London, Ming is owned by Miss Rider, a departmental head at Woolwich Polytechnic.

We go much further afield now—to Calgary, Alberta, Canada. The Calgary Cat Club held their second All Breed Show, combined L.H. and S.H. Specialties. This actually means two shows in one. Siamese, for instance, enter in the All Breed and Specialty under different judges. The list of trophies offered is formidable. Children under 12 were encouraged to exhibit for cat with longest whiskers, largest eyes, etc. With the catalogue comes a most entertaining letter from Mrs. D. E. Borrett, the Club's Secretary.

She writes : " Our Show was one of the most successful anyone had ever heard of. We hit front page in the newspapers, had T.V. and radio coverage, nearly a page in America's leading sports magazine, and coast to coast network of C.B.C. (Canadian Broadcast Co.) for 5,000 miles. It all started with us feeling that we needed an attendance stimulator. The one the Club considered best was a Mousing

Contest. The local lumber company made us a maze with glass front and top separated into six compartments, with a cat size hole in each."

" We then challenged the 1957 World Champion Mouser in Memphis, Tennessee, over 3,000 miles away, and he consented to defend his title. He arrived in Calgary to a full fanfare and some wonderful publicity, including a 'milk-tail party' in the cocktail lounge at the airport. There were a number of local contenders for the title and the new Champion turned out to be Mrs. Chris Hall's Ferdinand Leo."

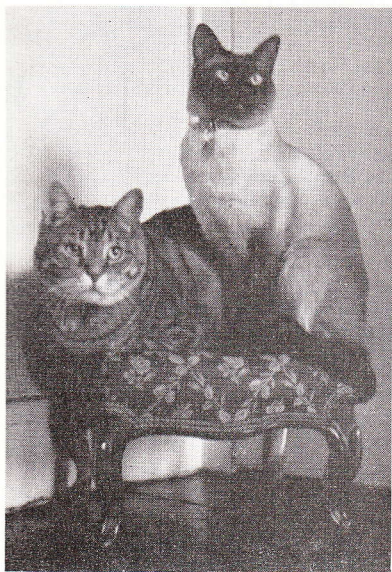

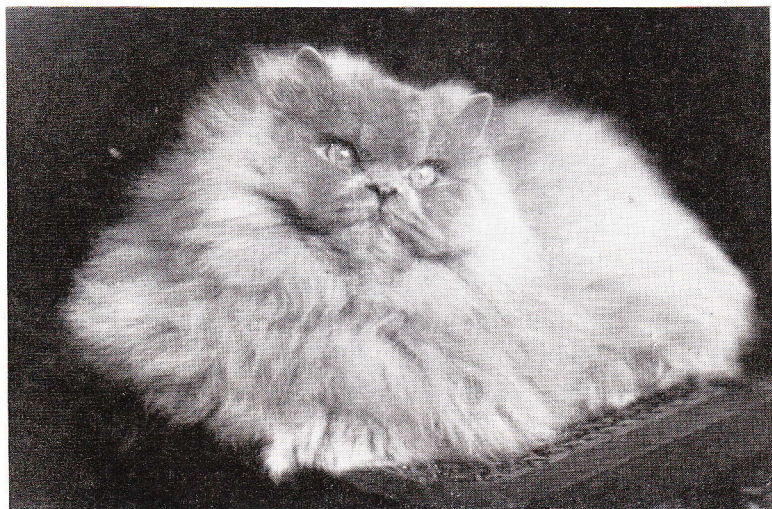

The Towe's "coming of age" show was last month's Croydon Cat Club's fixture at Central Hall, Westminster,

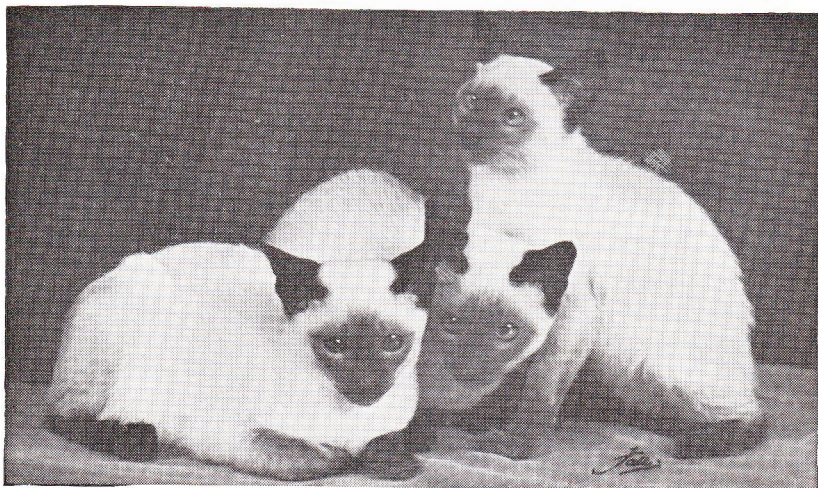

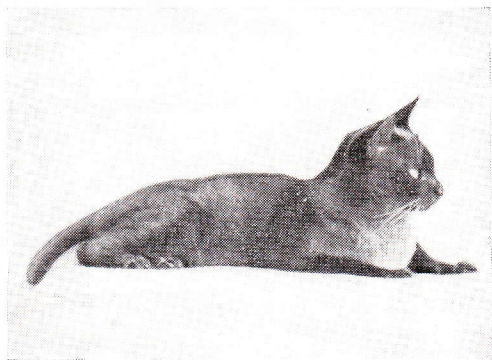

CH. AUTUMN HAZE



These pictures are of special interest to breeders of Burmese. The accompanying notes supplied by Mrs. A. M. Charles, of Rode, near Bath, ran as follows: "There has been considerable speculation as to whether my Ch. Autumn Haze is pure Burmese on account of his having Siamese ancestors. His mother is a hybrid sired by a Champion Burmese ex a Siamese Seal Point and mated to Casa Gatos Darkee produced both Burmese and hybrid kittens. Autumn Haze is one of the Burmese. As far as I am aware he is the only British bred outcross being used as a stud. All queens mated to him have produced normal Burmese kittens but a certain amount of misunderstanding has continued to exist about him. So in an effort to clarify the point, I mated him to my own Siamese queen, who is S.P., but carries the C.P. factor. The mating resulted in seven hybrid kittens being born in September last. The photograph (shown above) was taken when they were $3\frac{1}{2}$ weeks old and should I think quite adequately prove that Autumn Haze is pure Burmese."

the effect is a violent poisoning and enteritis in the case of cattle, with subsequent abortion of the young. It produces the effect by upsetting the copper metabolism. The animal has a craving for copper, which, if fed in sufficient quantities, will cure the trouble.

But overall, the supply of water to cats is a necessity, and this fact should always be borne in mind by the fancier.

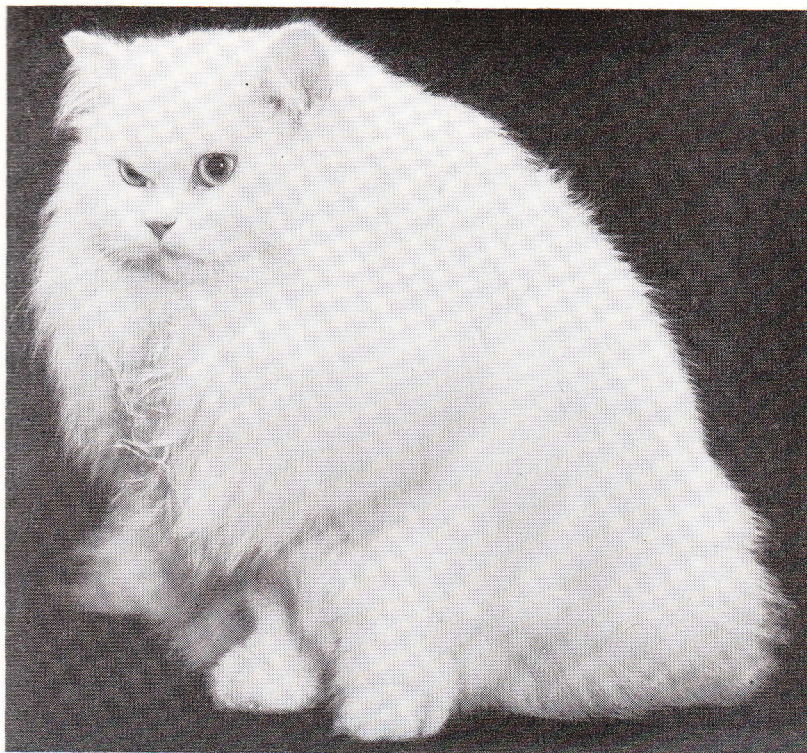

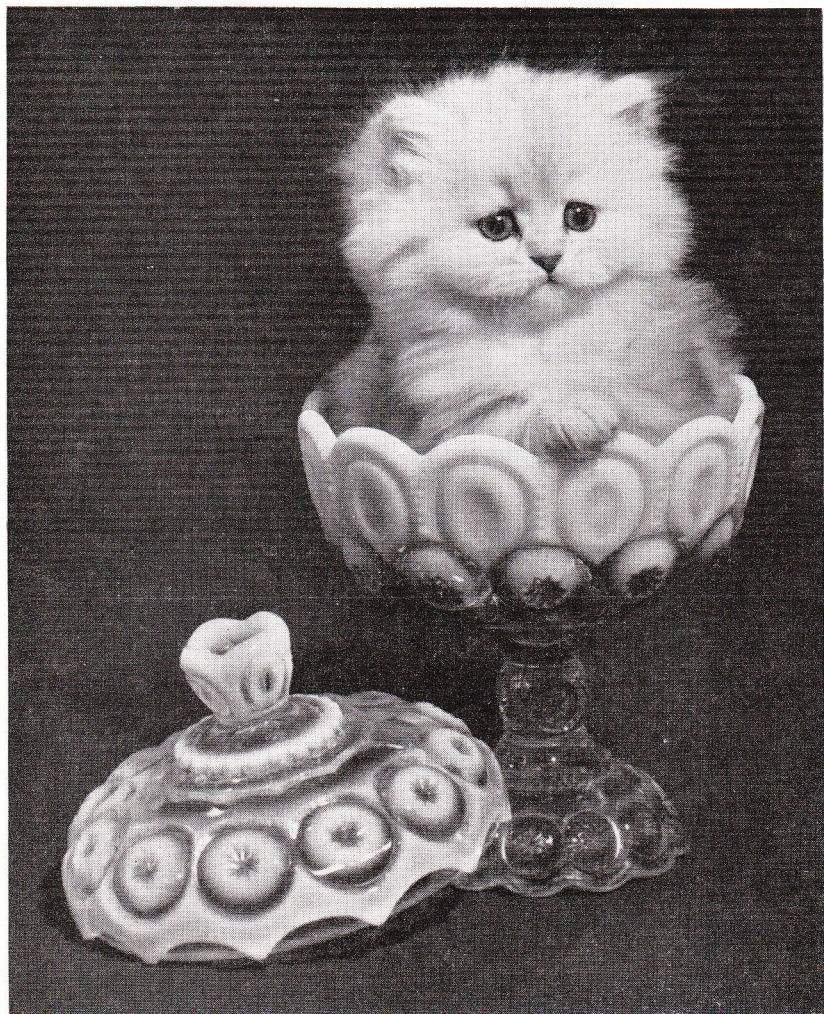

Gordon Laughner

A captivating study by the young artist in animal photography whose profile opens on the opposite page.

MR. GORDON LAUGHNER (*Los Angeles, California*)

A YOUNG man, a cat and a camera! Many years ago when Mrs. Laughner brought these prime requisites together she little realized the interesting results that would emerge and the happy consequences they would have in our Fancy. For they represented the beginning for Gordon Laughner, of Los Angeles, the son whose photographic skill is becoming increasingly recognized throughout America, particularly among our fanciers.

Although his mother is no longer with him to encourage and advise, G.L. likes to think back to those early days when his interest in feline photography took shape. He recalls that his mother was always fond of cats and it was through her that he learned to understand and appreciate the value of a cat's friendship.

How well he remembers Playboy, a superb mahogany Red Persian kitten who was the pride of them both. For one of his first assignments at the Art Center School of Photography in Los Angeles, he submitted a photo of Playboy. Playboy became one of his favourite models and his instructor tactfully informed him that he should select another subject to work with.

When Playboy passed away another cat was purchased from Vivian and Wally Peterson of California. This precious little Silver Persian kitten was named Vevay Silver Shah. Not long after a playmate was obtained from the Petersons and named Holly. Gordon has much to thank the Petersons and the two kittens for as not long afterwards

he was invited to become official photographer for the Westshore Cat Club's show in 1952. This was his first show as the photographer and a spectator as well. He does not mind mentioning that it was a nerve wracking experience for him because while all the activity of the show was going on, he was trying his very best to make each photo a fine one. However, it was great fun, a tremendous challenge and a wonderful education.

To-day, he acts as official photographer for about eight shows each season in the Southern California area but wishes that he could devote more time to this type of photography so that he could travel farther afield.

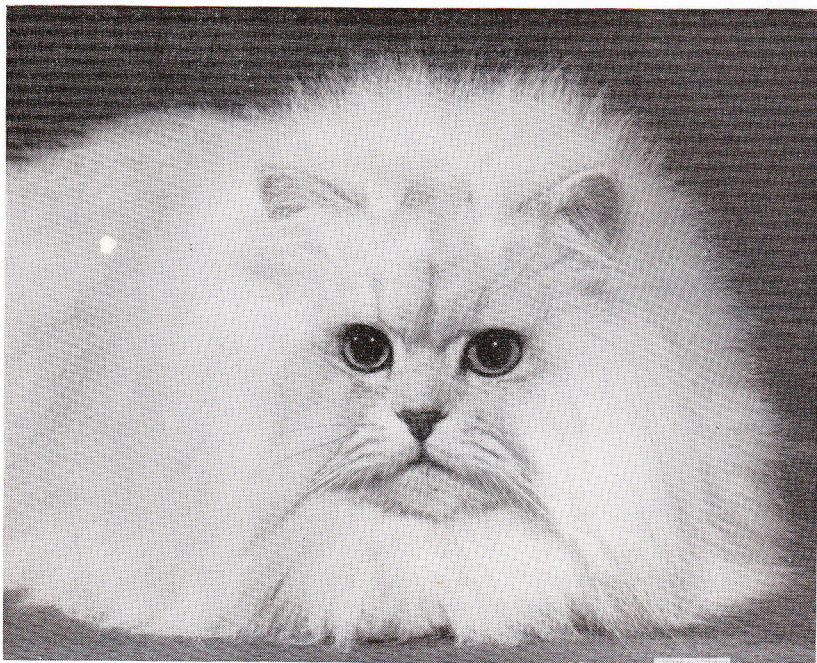

In working with cats at the shows he has found it imperative to have a small soundproof room away from the main area. Sometimes his patrons think he is being rude by permitting only the owner to be present with the door closed and a sign reading "Model now being posed, please do not disturb." He feels it is very important to have the least noise possible and above all to exercise complete gentleness, kindness and patience with the cats. With the owner's permission, he likes to hold the cat for a while in an effort to make friends and gain its confidence. He will even resort to a little "cat-talk," meanwhile strolling around the room giving the camera and the lights a good investigation and allowing plenty of time for the cat to sniff them over. The cat is then groomed with a final touch for the actual photo.

Gordon works with a 45 Crown Graphic Camera using an Ektar 5½"

lens, two stop lighting units and a display type corrugated paper which acts as a suitable background. The colours are changed to suit the subject. He believes that by having everything set up before the actual portrait is taken eliminates a lot of unnecessary confusion which can so easily upset a cat.

To date, his biggest surprise and thrill was to have three of his cat portraits accepted for hanging at the Los Angeles County Fair's Second Annual International Exhibition of Photography in September of this year. As wins, he received a bronze medal for "Pretty Mickey," a first place award for "The Quintuplets," and a third place award for "The Explorers." These prints were all entered in the Portrait Division sponsored by the Professional Photographers' Association of California. A very fine achievement, indeed.

Gordon spent three years in the United States Army during World War II with a photographic unit. These duties helped him in his studies in photography.

Besides Vevay and Holly, the Silvers, he is also the proud owner of Stardust Prince (Dusty for short), a Blue Persian male whom he purchased from Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Konkel. He does not have much time to photograph his own cats for he is so busy posing and photographing cats for other people.

Like most people in all walks of life, Gordon has an ideal. He is Walter Chandoha, recognized as the foremost animal photographer of our present day. It is Gordon's wish that you may have learned something from this little story of a dedicated young man and that you too, will be able to make many fine portraits of your own cats. All you need is the right time, the right subject and the right place. He makes it all sound so simple! Now look at some of his work in this issue and compare it with your own!

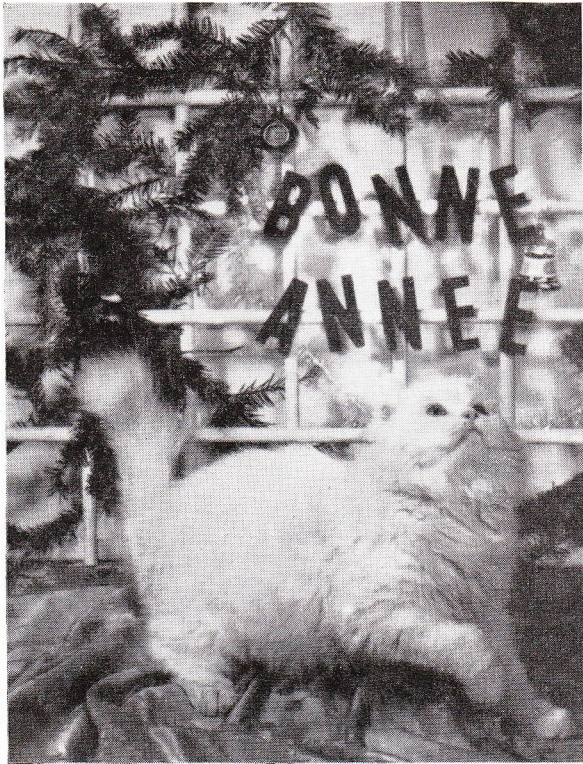

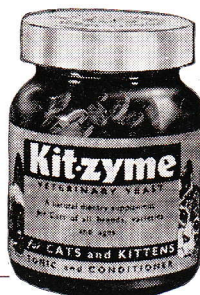

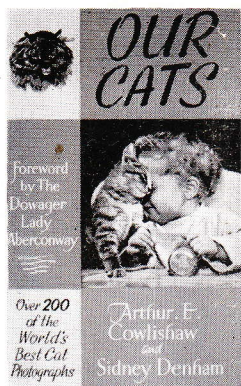
